### Discovered a bug Exterminator.

Lethbridge Alta., Jan. 21.—A discovery of great importance has been made by Dr. A. Watson, Dominion bacteriologist, at the quarantine station here, no less than the isolation of the germ known as the trypanosome, which causes "sleeping sickness," one of the scourges of Africa. Dr. Watson was in town yesterday, and imparted to some of his friends the interesting information.

The dread germ was obtained from the blood of a cotton tail rabbit, which the scientist captured for purposes of experimentation, and which had the disease of which rabbits have been dying in great numbers throughout the country this winter.

Every seventy years a scourge sweeps the rabbits almost out of existence. During the past seven years the virus gradually accumulates in the rabbits, till another scourge again decimates them. This happened this year.

### TORONTO.

Toronto, Jan. 22.—Prices held very steady at the western cattle market this morning. The quality of the cattle was, however, not up to the mark. There were few fat animals on sale and the general impression is that the farmers are bringing them in too soon. On the basis of quality prices are higher than last week.

Total receipts were 73 loads, containing 1,175 cattle, 1,247 sheep and lambs, 450 hogs and 74 calves.

An advance of 50c per cwt was made in calves. Export ewes were easier in the better grades. Grain-fed lambs and common lambs were unchanged. A sharp decline of 30c per cwt. was made in hogs.

In butcher cattle the highest price for straight loads was \$4.60. Fancy stuff sold 10c per cwt. higher, at \$4.80, but there was little of this grade.

Exporters brought no higher than \$5 per cwt.

### Wheat Farther North.

Ottawa, Jan. 23.—Before the Agricultural Committee of the House of Commons to day Prof. MacCoun stated that the northern limit for wheat production would be gradually extended. He stated that altitude, not latitude, hinders wheat growing, but that a new variety, which will ripen farther north, will be produced.

Trinidad, Jan. 23.—Twenty miners are reported killed in an explosion at the Colorado Fuel & Iron Company's mine at Primero. The explosion occurred today in the main entry, and is supposed to have been caused by a windy shot.

The mine was caved in, and it is impossible to gain an entrance. It is difficult to learn the number of fatalities. Women and children gathered about the mine entrance, and miners from adjoining camps are assisting in the work of rescue. All the dead are probably foreigners.

Sombra, Jan. 21.—During the heavy windstorm on Saturday night, the barge Spademan broke away from its moorings here and was driven on the beach. It will be easily taken off. The schooner Starlight, moored in Belle river, was blown across St. Clair river, and is aground on Fawn island. Several other boats broke from their moorings but were soon secured by watchmen aboard. The storm was the worst ever experienced in this vicinity.
