BROOKE COUNCIL.
Alvinston, August 3rd, 1912.
Council met pursuant to adjournment. Members all present. Minutes of previous meeting read, and on motion of Mr. Sutton, seconded by Mr. Annett, were approved.

Engineer's report read on the proposed Smith-Patterson Drain, on the line between lots 10 and 11 across Concessions 4, 5, 6 and 7. Total cost \$10500. Assessment on lots \$8215, on roads \$2285.

Sutton—Monro, that as none of the petitioners have asked their names to be taken off petition, that the report be accepted, and Clerk instructed to prepare a by-law for submission at next meeting, authorizing the construction of this drain and the borrowing by debentures of the sum of \$10,500, the estimated amount required for the work.—Carried.

Letter read from A. S. Code, O.L.S., that he could not do any more Township work for two months, as he was going to do surveying in New Ontario.

Letters read, received from Messrs. Moncrieff & Wilson, in reference to the work being done on the Bourne Drain. Referred to Commissioner.

Archie McNeil applied for remuneration for 1 lamb killed by dogs, valued by Inspector at \$6.00. Daniel Kelly for 2 lambs and 1 ewe killed and 4 worried, valued at \$34.00, and Andrew Beattie for 4 sheep worried valued at \$7.50.

Annett—Sutton, that Mr. McNeil be paid the sum of \$4.00. Mr. Kelly the sum of \$22.66 and Mr. Beattie the sum of \$5.00.—Carried.

Petition received from W. S. Taylor and two others, asking that the area described as the north halves of lots 10 and 11 in the 10th Con. be drained by municipalizing and extending the Johnston Award Drain.

Fisher—Sutton, that petition be received and Engineer instructed to examine and report, with a view to complying with prayer of petition.—Carried.

Monro—Sutton, that Council open as a Court of Revision on the Weidman Drain By-law, the Reeve in the chair.—Carried.

Declarations taken, one appeal.

Charles Cory sworn said, I am assessed too high as I cannot drain to Township, without crossing another party's land.

Darville—Fisher, that the sum of \$5.00 be struck off the assessment on lot E 1/2 W 1/2 Con. 9, and \$5.00 off lot E 1/2 W 1/2 Con. 9, and the reductions to \$10.00 added to the amount payable by township. These changes made and Court closed.—Carried.

Monro—Sutton, that the by-law for the repairs and tiling of the 15-16 siderside drain, across 4, 5, 6, be read a third time and passed.—Carried.

The officers of the Brooke Municipal Telephone System, submitted for approval the terms of their purchase of the McGillicuddy-Zavitz line, from lot 14 con. 10, to the south boundary of the Village of Watford. Price \$200.

Sutton—Fisher, that purchase be approved, and agreement officially signed by the Reeve and Clerk.—Carried.

By-law to authorize the levy and collection of the sum of \$150.00 annually on the area comprising the Village of Inwood, for street lighting purposes, submitted and read.

Monro—Annett, that bylaw be provisionally adopted, and Clerk have the same printed, with a list of the parties interested, their lots, assessments, and charges for 1912, as based on the assessment for the present year. Copies to be served on each party assessed, and Dr. C. L. Taylor appointed to serve notices.—Carried.

Monro—Sutton, that Council do now adjourn to meet in the Village of Inwood on Saturday the 31st August, 1912.—Carried.

Shot Dead While on Duty.
Floyd N. Robinson, a member of the Detroit police force, was shot to death on Saturday, July 27th, by Fred Milne, a paroled prisoner, whom he had stopped to question regarding several robberies in which it was suspected that Milne had a hand. The shooting occurred on Washington boulevard, and Robinson, who was within three feet of Milne, received a bullet in the heart, dying instantly.

Deceased was a native of Watford and was about 29 years old. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Thos. Robinson, some years ago highly respected residents of this place. He leaves a wife and infant daughter about four months old. He is also survived by his parents, two brothers, Arthur, of Brooklyn, N.Y., and Frank, of Detroit, and a sister, Mrs. A. J. Crone, also of Detroit. He had been on the force about a year. The funeral took place on July 29th to Evergreen cemetery, and was conducted with police honors.
