The Foreign Society.

During the past missionary year the Foreign Christian Missionary Society received 947 personal contributions; that is, 947 persons made gifts not included in what was given through the churcher Sunday-schools, and Endeavor Societies. These personal gifts amounted to \$14.928.90, an average of \$14.81 each. The gifts ranged all the way from ten cents to \$691.66 each.

The year closed with only seven hundred dollars in the treasury. The monthly payments averge \$6 000. From the convention in October till March the receipts do not amount to more than one-third as much as the current expenses. The Society must either borrow money or allow the workers to go unpaid. With no securities which it can use as collateral, the ability to borrow money is limited. The workers ought not to be left unpaid. They must pay what they owe, or be discredited in the sight of the heathen. If the friends of the Society tact with them, and numbers of lives will come to the rescue, there will be have been lost.
