CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

The lumber situation in Ontario calls for no lengthy review, as in few respects does it differ from last week. Business is of an average volume. In Toronto trade is keeping up remarkably well and all the dealers are busy, but some dissatisfaction is expressed with the country demand. The approach of the time for cold weather is operating to curtail the consumption of lumber in the country, and, remembering the cold winter experienced a year ago, dealers are taking every precaution against having to carry a burdensome stock through the winter. Ottawa prices have been shaded in a few instances, but the strong undertone has not been impaired. The stocks at the mills are larger than might be desired, but there are no evidences of more than ordinary anxiety to realize.

Lath prices at the mills are now firmly established at \$2.60 for No. 1 white pine and \$2.50 for No. 2, this being an advance of 10 cents as compared with the prices at which lath could be purchased one month ago. Shingles are unchanged, although a few of the smaller manufacturers are offering B. C. red cedars a little below \$2.60 for XXX. At this price there is no profit, and it is only a matter of time until higher prices will rule.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

Lumber market conditions in the Eastern Provinces are gradually getting into better shape. Prices are firmer than they

have been for some time and on all sides there is shown a remarkable degree of confidence and a feeling that the bottom has been reached in spruce values. Local and United States trade is improving and there is more inquiry for British specifications. For the American market all of the larger sizes are in strong demand and many of the mills will go into the winter season with a comparatively small amount of unsold stock. No doubt the intention of the operators to greatly curtail work in the woods this winter has had a strengthening effect upon the market. Following the action of the New Brunswick lumbermen, the Maritime Lumbermen's Association of Nova Scotia, at a meeting held at Truro last week, passed a resolution agreeing to reduce the cut this winter by at least one-half, while some of the members announced their intention to suspend operations entirely until prices improve.

New Brunswick cedar shingles are more active but are still selling on the basis of \$3.75 for Extras and \$2.65 for Clears, Boston delivery. Stocks are not large and some manufacturers are inclined to hold for an advance of 5 to 10 cents.

MANITOBA AND BRITISH COLUMBIA.

The recent fire in Winnipeg has further increased the demand for lumber, which was previously of large proportions in that city. All the dealers are busy and are anticipating a continuation of activity well into the winter months. There has of late been very little change in values, although there is less complaint of price-cutting than was the case a few weeks ago. The situation in British Columbia has not improved to any extent, and most of the interior mills are still carrying heavy stocks. Foreign shipments, however, have been fairly good, as during the first nine months of this year forty seven cargoes were loaded at Vancouver and Chemainus. Exports to Japan have been larger than usual.

UNITED STATES.

The developments of the past week have been favorable to a stable market and to a gradual enhancement of values. From almost every district comes the report of a steady trade at firm prices, while in some instances sharp advances have taken place. White pine lumber is from \$1 to \$2 higher at the mills than during the summer months, and this is expected to lead to some advance at least by retailers, who up to the present time have been slow to profit by the improved conditions. At Buffalo and Tonawanda cuts and better are selling more actively than at any time this season and the lower grades continue to be in urgent request. Yellow
