arbitrations could do. I quoted him when I had audience with His Majesty the King, last May, and he said "I think that is right"; and he made this comment, "This movement, unlike peace conferences, arbitrations, etc., binds together the hearts," and when we of that "it binds together the hearts of the future great leaders hearts is greater than the unity of nations. When you bind together the hearts of the students of the different nations, you have established the strongest bond that can be established on earth. Christ

I venture to hope that the next time it is my pleasure to meet the students of this great province, I may find branches of this great afternoon, and that you will be linked together under this federation that will enable you to send out waves of influence into the world.

## BRITISH COLUMBIA—HER OPPORTUNITY AND RESPONSIBILITY

(Address Delivered at the Laymen's Missionary Conference, Vancouver, Oct. 19th, 1911, by Rev. R. J. Wilson, M.A.)

The subject which has been assigned to me as above is not of my own choosing. It has been interpreted to me to mean the opnission work within British Columbia. If, therefore, my remarks thering of this sort demands it will not do us any harm to remember pendent upon the vigorous, earnest, devoted consecration of the spirit as that which thrust forth the Christians of the first century world task
