Service counterparts. An evaluation team made up of members from the Department of National Defence and Treasury Board, ranked all military trades using a point evaluation system based on skill and knowledge required for each trade. The pay rates determined from the matches that were made provided the salary range into which all 90 trades fell according to the point scores they received.

NATIONAL DEFENCE-PAY AND ALLOWANCES, CORPORAL TRADESMEN

Question No. 2,127-Mr. Forrestall:

With respect to the 1,100 Corporal-Tradesmen who have been "re-allocated to a lower pay category" and as a result "will receive little or no pay increase" (a) what are the seven trades (b) by environment, what is the percentage distribution (c) was the principle of area prevailing rates used to determine that these men were overpaid and, if so, is it government policy to apply the principle of prevailing rates to part or all of the CAF with respect to pay levels (d) on what date will their pay levels be reviewed (e) on what date were they last awarded a pay increase?

Mr. Jack Cullen (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of National Defence): (a) and (b) Weaponman Surface, 100 per cent Sea; Weaponman Underwater, 100 per cent Sea; Firecontrolman, 99 per cent Sea, 1 per cent Air; Air Traffic Controller, .5 per cent Sea, 8 per cent Land, 91.5 per cent Air; Radioman (Sea), 100 per cent Sea; Radar Plotter (Sea), 98.8 per cent Sea, .8 per cent Land, .4 per cent Air; Sonarman (Sea), 100 per cent Sea.

(c) No, the principle of area prevailing rates was not used to determine that these men were overpaid. The pay categories or payfields for the seven trades along with the

remaining 83 trades in the military were determined by an evaluation team, comprising members of the Department of National Defence and Treasury Board, who ranked all military trades on a point evaluation system based on the skill and knowledge requirements for each trade. The CAF Trade Specifications call for higher trade skills and knowledge for the above-noted trades at the ranks of Sergeant and above. Consequently, these tradesmen were assigned to a higher pay category (i.e. pay field). On the other hand, lower trade skills and knowledge are required for Corporal and below and, therefore, the tradesmen in question were assigned to a lower pay field.

(d) Pay categories (payfields) will be upgraded upon promotion to Sergeant (Pay level 6A) for the seven trades. However, Canadian Force Headquarters continually reviews trade specifications for all military trades to assess their validity according to current military requirements and a possible restructuring of certain trades could result.

(e) There were last awarded a general pay increase on October 1, 1970.
