CANADA-UNITED STATES AUTO PACT—POSITION OF DISCUSSIONS—INVESTMENT BY INDUSTRY IN CANADA

Mr. Edward Broadbent (Oshawa-Whitby): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce. In view of the fact that the specific item of trade that has been of most concern to the United States in recent months has been the Canada-United States automotive agreement, is the minister in a position to tell us what has happened in terms of discussion of that agreement up to this point?

Hon. Alastair Gillespie (Minister of Industry, Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, that particular so-called irritant was one of several that were discussed on an earlier occasion. There have not been any discussions with respect to that particular item in recent months.

Mr. Broadbent: In view of the concern being expressed at present in Canada by both the parts sector of the industry and the assembly plant sector concerning investment decisions that are now being made in that industry, the concern being that all the investment now will take place on the American side of the border for future production, would the minister assure the House that he will obtain assurances from the Canadian side of that industry that we will get our fair share of future investment in the automotive industry during the next 12 months?

Mr. Gillespie: Any discussion with respect to the benefits of the automotive pact or its reconsideration or revision must, in our view, provide significant benefits for Canada.
