Some Hon. Members: Oh, oh!

Mr. Rodriguez: I remind the Hon. Member for Lévis (Mr. Fontaine) that since the fall of 1984 we produced a document called Canada Unlimited. That document is composed of opinion and thoughful analyses of the economic situation. It contains very concrete and specific proposals in respect of dealing with Canada's most serious problem—unemployment. Then we put a youth task force on the road and produced a positive document which makes recommendations to the Government. There was Tax Probe 86 in which we made some concrete proposals to the Government about a more fair, just and distributive income tax system. They sit on their fins and what do they say? They say that they believe in the private sector. I think they have all gone to kindergarten and have repeated that the private sector is the engine of the economy. I think they have been programmed to spit that out. The people

of the country will remember in the next election, and they will be spat right out.
