GOVERNMENT OF ONTARIO

Mr. Derek Lee (Scarborough—Rouge River): Mr. Speaker, yesterday Ontarians listened with anticipation to the throne speech by the newly elected New Democratic Party government in Ontario. They waited to hear if Premier Rae would keep all those election promises that he made. The public has not forgotten those NDP

negative campaign ads filled with false information, which ended with a big x on the TV screen.

Now, Premier Rae, it is time to move to the next letter of the alphabet, the letter *i*. Why didn't you deal with your campaign promise to fund 60 per cent of elementary education costs? Why didn't you deal with your promise about the 10.5 per cent mortgage financing you were offering for home purchases? BILL C-45

Mr. Lyle Kristiansen (Kootenay West—Revelstoke): Mr. Speaker, for four and a half years this Conservative government and the Ministry of Labour have demonstrated their contempt for the health and safety of our parliamentary employees and contempt for Parliament itself.

In June 1986 Parliament passed Bill C-45, the Parliamentary Employment and Staff Relations Act, which applied the key provisions of the Canada Labour Code to Parliament Hill workers. Part I of the act was proclaimed that same year, but Part II, Labour Standards, and Part III, Occupational Health and Safety, have never been proclaimed.

Because of the government's failure to act on this expressed wish of Parliament, our workers on the Hill, unlike all other private and public sector workers in the federal domain, do not have the right to refuse work which may be dangerous to their health; do not have the right to require a government inspector to investigate the many health and safety problems in our work place; and do not have the right to have work place health and safety committees monitor their working environment.
