reasonably hope not only to preserve the acquifitions we have already made from France, but in that case to add more to The Spaniards are in possession of the island of Cuba, and half of Hispaniola; these islands, I am credibly informed, are very accessible; much more so than Guardaloupe; and it is not very prefumptuous to fay, that our arms would probably be crowned with some conquest in this part of the world that would extremely well help to reimburse us for the expences of the The Philippines islands in the East-Indies at prefent yield the Spaniards little or no profit; but it is well known that this is their own fault: for their value, if well managed, is prodigious. They are weak and exposed to a degree that is furprizing, confidering their importance. A strong British squadron would hardly fail of making some impression here, that might be of the greatest advantage to this kingdom. In short, the dominions of Spain are so scattered, so unweildy, and yet so valuable.
