SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

A NY person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant nust appear in person at the Dominion ands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by ather, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Must reside upon the home-stead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from the date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300. W. W. CORY.
