The purpose of this volume is to place before the public all the essential facts as to currency, coinage and banking, from the wampumpeage of the colonies to the notes of our Federal Reserve Banks as well as the indispensable political history connected therewith. The basis of the work is "The Contest for Sound Money," by the same author, first published in 1903, but that earlier book has been rewritten and supplemented so that as now issued it covers the period from the adoption of the United States Constitution to the present day. It deals fully and explicitly with our coinage laws and coinage by mints; it gives the complete history of the national banking system and contrasts and compares the banking systems of various states; it relates the history of the legal tender notes, the history of the silver controversy, and sets forth the various international efforts in favor of the bi-metallic standard. There is also an introductory chapter describing the currency systems of the principal commercial nations and explaining the emergency measures adopted by European nations to meet the exigencies of the war of 1914.
