NTARIO RAILWAY BOARD VANTSSTAONGER BRIDGES

City Engineer Wonders Why Such Sudden Interest is Manifested in Civic Structures.

If the Ontario Railway and Munici pal Board insists on dictating to Toronto how all its briggs, over which steam or electric railway is to pass,

ronto how all its bridges, over which steam or electric railway is to pass, are to be built, how about all the other municipalities of Ontario?

This is the question being asked at the city hall because of the sudden zeal with which the railway board is examining plans and pointing out the limitations of bridges already built or under construction, and the equal zeal with which it is billing the city for the cost of inspection by its engineer.

In addition to ordering that the plans for the new high-level bridge across the Don at Queen-street be altered, so that the girders and columns be made stronger, the railway board declares that the Wilton-avenue and Dundas bridges are unsafe for 30 ton weights. City Engineer Rust is surprised at the board's interest in the city's bridges. He said last night that he didn't know of any special act being passed giving the board such powers, and if the board has had the right all along, why was it not exercised before?

"I suppose other municipalities are in the same fix," said Mr. Rust. "The bridges under construction in Toronto lately have been much heavier than we used to build them. If they have to be strengthened, it can be done, but the 20-ton weight for the Wilton-avenue and Dundas bridges is beyond any tax which I think these bridges will ever be called upon to bear, and it seems hardly necessary to do anything. As to the Queen-street bridge, the difference between our plans and those of Mr. Middlemist amounts to only one-sixteenth of an inch extra thickness in some parts of the bridge. We could easily have altered the plans for the Wilton-avenue bridge, but we didn't get notice."

When a conductor hands you a transfer it is not crumpled or folded up. You can verify it at a glance.

When you hand a transfer to the conductor it should be in the same condition. Then he can verify it at a glance and you can pass immediately into the car.

This should be more convenient for you than having to stand aside until he has time to smooth it out and read it.

Certainly it is more convenient for other people who are waiting behind you.

If you have a proper consideration for their rights you will not delay their entrance to the car by tendering a crumpled-up transfer to the conductor.
