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

The first detonation was extremely violent and shook the vessel fore and aft. It was followed by other shocks. The crew were thrown into a condition of panic. They rushed wildly hither and thither about the deck.

The men forward, who had been attending the lecture, clambered over the bulwarks and jumped down, some of them to the deck, and others to the stone quay. Many of these sustained fatal injuries.

The hundreds of men below deck were enshrouded in blinding smoke, and, while they groped their way toward the exits, suffocating fumes caused many of them to fall unconscious.

In the meantime, the explosions had become more frequent, and the entire afterpart of the lena caught fire. Shells and charges in the magazines contilued to burst and masses of metal were hurled into the air, to fall everywhere about the decks and the arsenal.
