The Massey Music Hall management will do their utmost to outstrip, artistically, any previous performances of oratorio ever given in Toronto. The matter of expense in securing all the best available talent has not steod in the way of the arrangements so far, and it is to be hoped that Toronto citizens will prove that they are not behind other cities in doing honor to the work and the memory of one of the greatest composers that ever lived.
