**RUSSIA HANGS ON.**

**Li Hung Chang and Chang Yin Huan said to be in Syngan with the Muscovite Schemers.**

London, March 23.—The Peking correspondent of The Times says:

China has not yet formally replied to the Russian ultimatum. It is anxiously awaiting further French action. Li Hung Chang and Chang Yin Huan have been appointed to confer with M. Pavloff, the Russian minister, on the subject of the Russian power. Both are credited with strong Russian sympathies. The Chinese are anxious of obtaining any practical abatement of the Russian demands. On the 22nd (Monday) the Emperor granted an audience to all the members of the Tsung-Li Yamen.

**A Policy of Resistance.**

Peking, March 20.—The Tsung-Li Yamen (Chinese Foreign Office) had the Russian members of the council strongly rebuked for their attitude of resistance. Orders were issued to strengthen the threatened posts by concentration of troops. The council, however, did not show any sympathy owing chiefly to the opposition of Li Huan, who was not prepared to agree practically to Russia's demands.
