INTERESTING LETTER CASE.

Man Fined for Not Delivering it to Proper Person.

Belleville, Nov. 20.—Judgment in an interesting case was given by Judge Magistrate Plunk of this city. Frederick Hewley of Thurlow was charged with stealing a letter belonging to Mrs. W. S. Spencer of Brockville, who had come to visit him and her friends in Thurlow. Hewley was asked by Mrs. Spencer to ask that the Belleville post-office for a letter for her, which he did, receiving one. Then, instead of handing the letter to Mrs. Spencer, who was still in the vicinity, he sent it to her husband, who retained it and used it in a case which the wife was endeavoring to make her husband support her. The magistrate acquitted the defendant of the charge of stealing the letter, but under a clause in the Post Office Act convicted him of neglect to deliver the letter to the person to whom it was addressed. A fine of \$25, with costs, was imposed.

The announcement of the prospective retirement of Rev. P. C. Parker from the pastorate of First-Avenue Baptist Church, to become secretary of the National Sanitarium Association, came as a great surprise to east enders, especially to the members of Mr. Parker's church, to whom the announcement was the first intimation in the matter. Mr. Parker has been very successful in his pastorate, and only recently had declined calls to two different churches of considerable prominence in Western Ontario.

VICTIMS LAID AT REST.

Fireman Who Met Death at New- market Buried Yesterday.

Newmarket, Nov. 20.—The funeral of Frank Burch, one of the firemen who met death in the explosion of the boilers at Cane's United Factories here last Wednesday morning, took place from his home on Main-street, at 2:30 this afternoon, and the deep sympathy of the town was shown by the numbers who followed the remains to the cemetery. All his fellow workmen from the factory were there in a body, and the Office Special staff of over 120 men showed their sympathy by taking the afternoon from their factory and attend- ing in a body. The Rev. Mr. Fuller held a short service at the house. The floral tributes were from employers, management and friends.

The remains of John Agnew, the other fireman who met death at the same disaster, were taken from here by the 3 o'clock G.T.R. train yesterday for interment in Cookstown Cemetery at 2:30 to-day. J. E. Cane and several of the men, along with Rev. Mr. McGilivray, drove over from here today to be present at his funeral.
