WIDOW.—A man dying without a will, having a wife and family, what part does the wife claim of his property? **Ans.**—One third, and the children take the remaining two-thirds.

DITCHES.—A died, leaving a farm to B, and after B's death to C. The engineer, under the statute, made an award for a ditch. Whose right is it to dig portion allotted to the farm? C having rented from B, but nothing mentioned in lease about ditching? **Ans.**—The present owner.

INSURANCE.—A died leaving a life insurance payable to his wife. Does his wife have a share as heirs. Does the children or a third, or any? Some of the children are under 21. Will their share be kept in the orphan's place, or will they get it now? **Ans.**—The wife takes one-third and the children the remainder in equal proportion; the shares of those under 21 can only be paid into court, or to a guardian appointed by the court for them.

CREDIT.—Is a blacksmith allowed to set tires on the street, or leave rigs stand on the street that are brought for repairs in a police village, and have the police of the same village sole power to have them removed? **Ans.**—The street can only lawfully be used as a public highway, and therefore the blacksmith has no right to carry on his trade in the street either by setting tires or encumbering it with rigs. The remedy is not in the power of the police as such, but any man may prosecute him for maintaining a public nuisance on the highway.
