REV. DR. FALCONER UNANIMOUS CHOICE FOR MODERATOR OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY

Rev. Dr. Somerville, of Owen Sound, Withdraws in Favor of Easterner --- Retiring Moderator, Dr. Armstrong, Discusses Home Life and Religion in Schools.

With the great majority of the 400 delegates in attendance, and almost as many Londoners present as interested spectators, the 32nd annual session of the General Assembly of the Canadian Presbyterian Church was opened at 8 o'clock last evening in the First Church, corner of Park and Duf-

The opening proceedings were simple, but none the less impressive, consisting as they did of the singing of the Doxology, a prayer by the retiring moderator, Rev. Dr. Armstrong, of Ottawa, asking for divine guidance for the assembly in its deliberations of the coming week, and the reading of a passage of Scripture.

The gathering was thoroughly representative of the church in Canada. Every presbytery from coast to coast is believed to have its delegate or delegates present to assist in the important work before the assembly. Clergy and laymen alike were thereveterans in the church work, some of 50 years' standing, who have seen Presbyterianism advance steadily from a comparatively small position until it has reached its present large and influential proportions. There were also the younger generation of clergy and lay workers, in addition to the missionaries from the home and foreign field, and the men who are guiding the work at the several Presbyterian colleges throughout the Dominion. Such a religious gathering has not been witnessed in London in many years.

The Election of Moderator.

The event at the opening session of the assembly which always creates the keenest interest among the delegates is the election of a moderator. Dr. Armstrong, one of the pioneer preachers of Ottawa, held the position during the past year with credit to himself and satisfaction to the assembly. Those most prominently mentioned as his successor, for some time past, were Rev. Dr. Falconer, of Pictou, N. S., one of the foremost ministers of the church in the Maritime Provinces, and Rev. Dr. Somerville, of Owen Sound, who as being thorought

In retiring, Dr. Armstrong said he. had attempted to discharge his duties always bearing in mind the welfare of the church, and he felt that in his work he had the good will and confidence of the members. He referred to the death during the past year of Dr. Warden, the treasurer of the church, and a number of others, the list being longer than usual, and he closed "his little modest work," as he expressed it, with "a modest little suggestion"-that the assembly should relieve the new moderator from his pastoral work that he may have a little freedom and be enabled to go about more in the discharge of his duties.


