Work of Four Hundred Roughs and Hoodlums, He Says.


TORONTO, Nov. 25.—Sir Robert Borden attributes the disturbance at Kitchener on Saturday, when a part of the audience assembled for his campaign meeting refused to permit either the premier or H. M. Mowatt, K.C., Unionist candidate for Parkdale, to speak, to an organized effort. In a statement given out here this evening, Sir Robert stated that this is, the first time in a public career of twenty-one years that he has been refused a hearing at a meeting that he sought to address. His statement is as follows:

Foe Repuised in Albania,
The Austrians have renewed their attacks on the Italian lines in Southern Albania, but met with a repuise at the defenders' hands, the war office announced last night. Some fighting in the Monastir district resulted in unchanged conditions at the close of the operations. The official statement reads:

"In Albania on Thursday night the enemy attacked our lines between the Voyusa and Osum Rivers. He was repulsed. A few local enemy advantages gaused between Monastir and Preziesca were nullified by our counter-attacks." Saturday's statement reads:

"On the mountain front, from Asiago Plateau to the Brenta, powerful thrusts, which the enemy stubbornly carried out after heavy artiliery preparation, all falled

BOMB EXPLODES IN POLICE STN., AND KILLS NINE

Seven Detectives, Two Policemen and One Woman Blown to Pieces.

TIMED TO KILL HUNDREDS

Patriotic Meeting Would Have Been Blown Up Had the Plot Succeeded.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 25.—Ten persons were kined and several injured last night, when a bomby designed to destroy the Italian Evangelical Church, in the heart of the third ward, an Italian settlement, exploded in central police station, where it had been carried for examination.

Seven detectives, two policemen and one woman were killed. The bomb, evidently with a time fuse attached, was found in the basement of the church.

church. When a searching party, equipped with fire department lights, entered the squad room, the scene was shocking to even the stern visaged policemen and firemen who are used to tragic emergencies.

A Horrible Scene.

The body of Detective Daye O'Brien lay in the centre of the room. He was lying face downward, partially covered with debris. Detective Stecker's body was found near the entrance to the squad room. He appeared to have received the full force of the charge. His body was mangied. Inside of his cloth ing was found a piece of steel about two inches square, which had passed through his body. His face, however, was not even scarred.

Every member of the central station detail except one was in the squad room to inspect the bomb.

Suspicion Saved Him.

Detective Burns, after inspecting the infernal machine, left the room to suggest to Lieut. Flood that it be placed in a pail of water. He was making his recommendation in Flood's office when the explosion occurred, killing those who remained in the room.

It is the belief of the police that the bomb was placed in the Evangelical Church by anarchists friendly to the Italians recently arrested for breaking up a patriotic meeting being held by a missionary from the church. A meeting was to have been held in the church tonight and the bomb was so timed that it would have exploded during the meeting.
