BORDEN ATTRIBUTES KITCHENER TROUBLE TO ORGANIZED BODY


Work of Four Hundred Roughs and Hoodlums, He Says.

TORONTO, Nov. 25.—Sir Robert Borden attributes the disturbance at Kitchener on Saturday, when a part of the audience assembled for his campaign meeting refused to permit either the premier or H. M. Mowatt, K.C., Unionist candidate for Parkdale, to speak, to an organized effort. In a statement given out here this evening. Sir Robert stated that this is, the first time in a public career of twenty-one years that he has been refused a hearing at a meeting that he sought to address. His statement is as follows:

"There was a deliberate and successful attempt to break up the meeting at Kitchener on Saturday evening. From what has since transpired it is apparent that the arrangements for this purpose were organized several days in advance of the meeting. The disturbance which prevented Mr. Mowatt any myself from speaking was the work of three or four hundred roughs and hoodlums and cannot in anywise be attributed to the respectable people of Kischener.

Austro-German Attacks Are Beaten On Asiago Plateau.

ENEMY'S FORCE WANING

Austrians Meet With Another Defeat in Southern Albania.

ROME, Nov. 25.—(British Admiralty, per Wireless Press).—Troops of the Italian first army on the Asiago plateau yesterday repulsed several furious Austro-German attacks and counter-attacked with success, the Italian war office announced today.

"On the Asiago plateur heroic parties of the first army who, for ten days, uninterruptedly and without yielding a yard of ground have been fighting for the defence of Meletta, yesterday again repulsed several furious enemy attracks and counter-attacks with success. 

BOMB EXPLODES IN POLICE STN., AND KILLS NINE

Seven Detectives, Two Policemen and One Woman Blown to Pieces.

TIMED TO KILL HUNDREDS

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 25.—Ten persons were kined and several injured last night, when a bomb, designed to destroy the Italian Evangelical Church, in the heart of the third ward, an Italian settlement, exploded in central police station, where it had been carried for examination. samination.

church.

A Horrible Scene.

The body of Detective Dave O'Brien lay in the centre of the room. He was lying face downward, partially covered with debris. Detective Stecker's body was found near the entrance to the squad room. He appeared to have received the full force of the charge. His body was mangled. Inside of his cloth ing was found a piece of steel about two inches square, which had passed through his body. His face, however, was not even scarred. Every member of the central station detail except one was in the squad room to inspect the bomb.

Suspicion Saved Him.

Detective Burns, after inspecting the infernal machine, left the room to suggest to Lieut. Flood that it be placed in a pail of water. He was making his recommendation in Flood's office when the explosion occurred, killing those who remained in the room.

It is the belief of the police that the bomb was placed in the Evangelical Church by anarchists friendly to the Italians recently arrested for breaking up a patriotic meeting being held by a missionary from the church. A meeting was to have been held in the church tonight and the homb was so timed that it would have exploded during the
