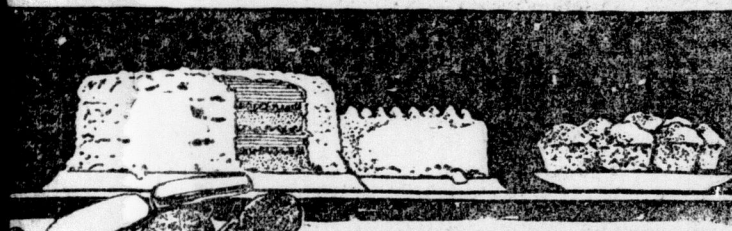

castle, the country home of Lord and Lady Algy, seen in the picture being the residence of one of California's multi-millionaires, an exact replica of an old Norman castle. Meanwhile Laford has succeeded in his scheme to disgrace Buckley in the eyes of his fellow-men. He is forced to fight his way out of the settlement. However, he is recognized before leaving camp in pursuit of Buckley. How Laford's plans are frustrated and Molly is saved by the man she loves, while the half-breed meets his just deserts in a plunging down a steep embankment in a buckboard, brings a smashing climax to an enthralling narrative.

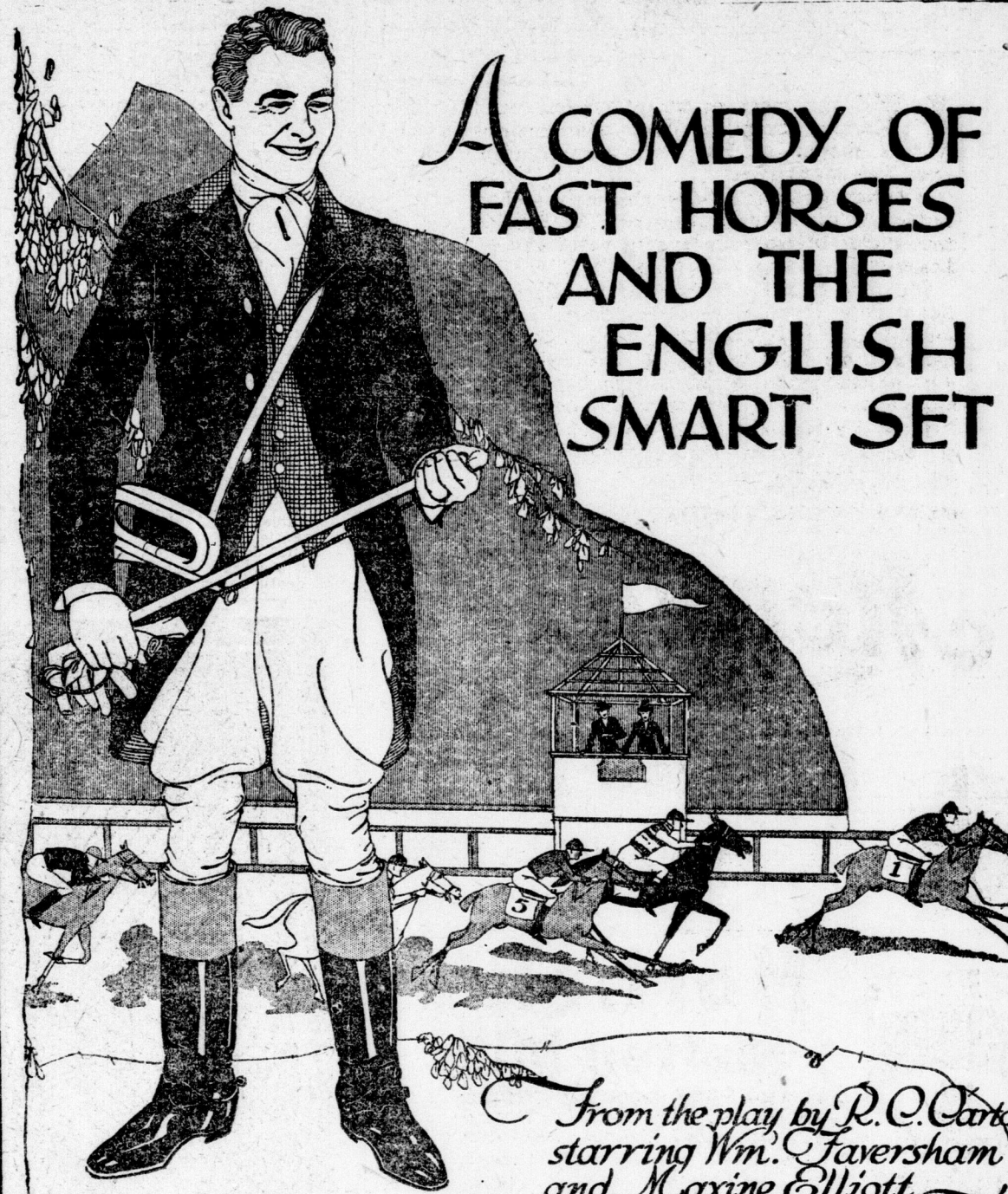

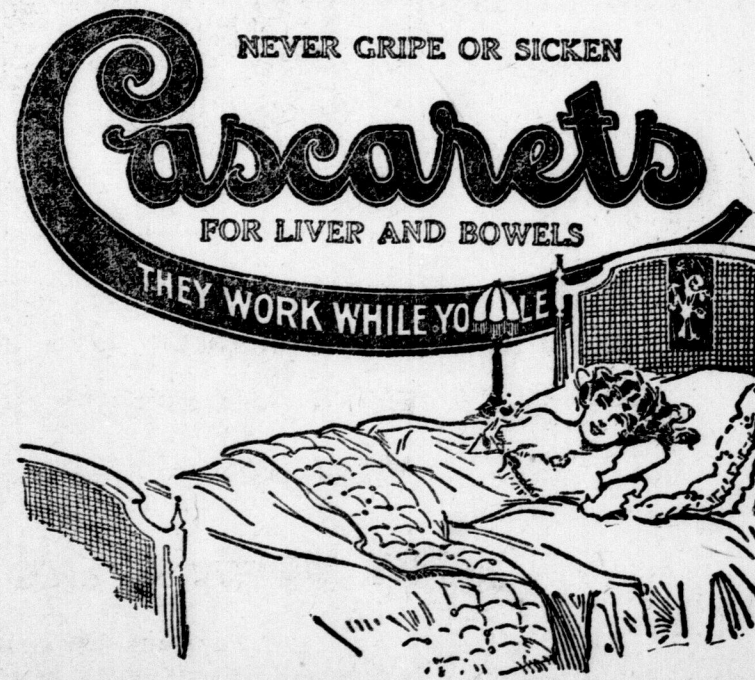
