STREET RAILWAYMEN TO STRIKE SATURDAY UNLESS PAY RAISED

Unanimous Vote Is Cast by Members of Union in Favor of
Walkout in Default of Settlement—Railway Board
May Be Called In.

A unanimous vote in favor of a strike on Saturday, May 1, unless their demands are met, was cast by street railway employees at a meeting at mid-night on Saturday in the Foresters' Hall, East London. Practically the whole membership of 240, consisting of motormen, conductors, trackmen, line men, barnmen and inspectors was present.

The situation was fully discussed, as the meeting did not end until 4:30 a.m. The men claimed it was absolutely impossible to live on their present wages, and that the increase of 21 cents an hour which they are asking would have to be given before they return to work. This would give them a scale averaging 65 cents an hour, not a wheel will turn Saturday morning unless the demands are met, they declared.

John Colbert, president of the union, and Ald. John Ashton, a member of the executive, pointed out, following the meeting, that the men were not taking hasty action by any means. They had notified the company six weeks ago that their demands would be made. Since then the union executive had met the management of the company five times. Each time the company stated that it was absolutely impossible for it to pay the wages.

The situation was fully discussed, as the meeting did not end until 4:30 a.m. The men claimed it was absolutely impossible to live on their present wages, and that the increase of 21 cents an hour which they are asking would have to be given before they return to work.
