NO BLAME ATTACHED TO RAIL EMPLOYEES FOR TRAVERS' DEATH

Jury Reaches Open Verdict After Four Minutes' Deliberation.

That the deceased, Robert W. Travers, came to his death suddenly on Wednesday, May 5, 1920, by being run over by a Grand Trunk Railway freight train, east of Waterloo street crossing in this city. No blame is attached to employees or officials for the fatality. This was the verdict of the coroner's jury at the inquest at the coronation Thursday night into the death of the late bank manager. It was reached in four minutes.

Only three witnesses were called upon to give evidence. Dr. D. H. Hogg declared death to be due to crushing about the abdomen. It was instant. He had treated him for diabetes for years.

W. J. Burrows, a Grand Trunk workman, had seen the deceased walking along the tracks from 9:30 o'clock in the morning until 3:20 o'clock in the afternoon. He thought him to be an official. Most of the walking was done between Wellington and Waterloo streets. When the freight train, which ran over him, was coming from the east, Mr. Travers walked beside it. As soon as Mr. Burrows learned of the accident he gave the signal to stop to the front-end brakeman. It was complied with immediately.

William L. Johnstone, freight inspector, saw Mr. Travers walk along beside the train and then bend down as though to take hold of a rod which was connected with the brakes. Instead of grasping it he fell prone across the rails. The freight train was going slow. It had just stopped a short time because it had passed over the cross-over switch.

Coroner (Dr.) Robert Ferguson conducted the inquest and Crown-Attorney J. B. McKillop secured the evidence. Detective Robert Eggleton gave the witnesses the oath.

BIRD NOTES

(Contributed by McIlwraith Ornithological Club.)

New birds continue to arrive daily, the following being the latest reported. Parula, Sandpiper, Yellow-bellied Vireo, Rose-breasted Grosbeak, Catbird, Maryland Yellowthroat, Wood Thrush, White-crowned Sparrow and Blackburnian Warbler. The only one of these to which special reference might be made is the Parula, which is sometimes called. Contrary to the usual practice with sandpipers this bird does not live near the water, being usually found in dry pasture fields. It was formerly quite abundant, but has been persistently hunted until it is extinct in some parts of the country. A few pairs still live near London, returning to the same fields year after year. Unfortunately their number does not seem to increase. They have a pretty habit when alighting of lifting their wings and then carefully folding them. They leave for the south early in September, going as far as Brazil, Peru and the Argentine Republic.
