#### PLAN TO REPLACE **ALL 4-INCH MAINS** WITH LARGE ONES

Utilities Commissioners Will Secure Estimates of Cost At Once.

Replacing four-inch mains with others eight or ten inches in diameter will be considered by the public utilities commission at an early date, according to Commissioner F. G. Mitchell. While the

Mf. Mitchell also advocated connecting any "stub ends" which may exist and making complete circuits of them.

Both of these are necessary steps if the city is to have adequate fire protection, he asserted. Referring to the recent Collegiate fire, he said that the public utilities commission was quite prepared for an investigation, as the official gauges would show that an adequate water pressure had been maintained. He admitted, however, that the pressure in the mains near the Collegiate might have been less than in the downtown mains, as they are much smaller.

"It is for that reason I think they should be replaced by larger oner." he said. "The four-inch mains were laid when the city was much smaller than it is now. The demand which they must supply has increased steadily, and they are wholly inadequate. When it comes to fighting a fire with them it is found to be almost impossible."
