The fighting greatly diminished in intensity on the new British front north of the Ancre yesterday. The Germans bombarded the new British positions, especially about Beaumont. The British artillery retaliated, causing several explosions by its fire.

By capturing Beaumont, St. Pierre Divion, and the semi-circular ridge that these villages dominated, the British have gained an important tactical advantage, according to Major-General F. B. Maurice, chief director of military operations.

Von Mackensen has so far been unable to resist the pressure of the Russians and the Rumanians on the eastern bank of the Danube and the road-Constantza railway.

Russian military experts believe that the crisis in the Rumanian Transylvanian front is thought to have eased the situation in that quarter. It is believed that the likelihood of a Teuton advance into Rumania has been removed for the present.

TO FIGHT EXTENSION
