AUSTRALIAN ORANGEMEN TO FORM NEW POLITICAL PARTY
They Will Soon Have Independent Organization in Federal Politics, Declares Melbourne Age—New Party Will Be Built on Radical Lines.

Melbourne, Aus., Nov. 25.—The Melbourne Age forecasts the early formation of a new Protestant party in federal politics.
The Radical-Protectionist daily says that the leaders of the Orange Institution in New South Wales, supported by representative Orangemen in Victoria and other states, are now perfecting plans for the creation of an Independent Orange party. Experience of the policy of leaving the existing parties with Orangemen has, it is said, convinced the Sydney leaders that if Protectionism is to become a real force in national affairs it must have separate political party behind it.
It is said that the program of the new party is to be a radical one, including graduated land tax, citizens' defense force, an Australian navy, preferential voting, "white Australia," preferential trade with the empire, a policy of non-interference with Irish questions, and maintenance of the Protestant succession.
These items have not, however, been approved by the authorized body, and are merely being spoken of by individuals as possible inclusion in any manifesto which might be issued.
When arrangements now pending are completed the new party is to be launched at a great demonstration in Sydney. At the last general election in 1906, several purely Protestant candidates were

CHATHAM WORLD LASHES THE HAZEN GOVERNMENT

Conservative Organ in Northumberland Grows Wrathful Because Mr. Swim Has Not Been Supported by Mr. Hazen—Burchill's Election Virtually Conceded.

Chatham, N. B., Nov. 25.—The political situation here is unchanged today. Supporters of Burchill and Swim are getting ready for the contest next Tuesday. Public meetings will be few in number. The committees that worked for Leggie will in the main support Burchill and will be assisted by many Conservatives who think he is the best representative to send from Northumberland to present.
Both Leggie and Morrissey are touring the county in the interest of Burchill, whose son, Percy Burchill, is also taking an active interest in the campaign.
Reports from all sections of the county concede the election of Burchill by a large majority, while there are very many who are puzzled over the situation. The candidature of Burchill meets with great favor everywhere.
The World Attacks Hazen Again.
Newcastle, N. B., Nov. 25.—(Special).—The campaign in Northumberland is warming up. W. S. Leggie, M. P., and James Robinson, ex-M. P., are being urged to support Mr. Burchill, and party workers are very active. It seems to be the general impression that a small vote will be polled notwithstanding the exciting events of the past two weeks. A great many men are already in the woods. The short notice given, too, will result in a smaller vote.
There seems no doubt, however, that Hon. Mr. Burchill will sweep the county, and the news that Swim had remained in the field was received with considerable surprise.
The World today devotes seven of its nine columns to politics and makes many rash and misleading statements. Finding that today has failed to bring over Mr. Morrissey and Mr. Hazen, the Tory organ returns to the attack on these gentlemen.
It says: "A government that throws over the candidate who is nominated by a convention of its supporters and endorses one who is nominated by its opponents cannot possibly last very long. The number of independent Liberals will increase, and every man of them will join the opposition the day and hour when their votes will turn the scale."
"Any government that is simple enough when it has a clear majority to sacrifice its supporters for the independent support of opponents ought to resign, put on pinafores and go to a political kindergarten for training."

COLLEGE MAN SAYS ARITHMETIC IS OF NO PRACTICAL VALUE

Professor of Clark University Declares Most of the Problems Are Sheer Waste and Bring Only Vexation of Spirit
Boston, Nov. 25.—"If you will permit me to speak from the standpoint of a father and of a man who succeeded in graduating from the Newton high school, and who has found differential calculus useful on occasion, I'd like to make one philosophical conclusion on scholastic training:—D—n arithmetic!"
This is the way Professor Arthur Gordon Webster, LL.D., professor of physics at Clark university, who had been introduced to the Massachusetts Schoolmasters' club at their first fall dinner, began the peroration of his address on the subject "What is a Scientist?"
"A scientist," said Dr. Webster, "is not a man who collects facts, as one might suppose. Rather he puts Nature on the witness stand, cross-examines her, makes his deductions and proves his theory."
"In doing this he makes a permanent contribution to humanity. It isn't something which he gives to his heirs in perpetuity, but it probably is as creditable as a big estate. And the boy who makes science his life work will get quite as much out of it."
"This isn't the idea of the man in the street. I can say that it isn't the American idea," continued Dr. Webster. "The dominating spirit is one of acquisition. In material comforts, in the multiplication of conveniences, we have gone forward at a swift pace, and the spirit of acquisition is dominant. The prevailing question is, 'What's in it for me?'"
"Suppose," he went on, "my little girl comes home bringing me some such complicated problem in interest as this: Mr. A. has Mr. B. his note for \$87.29, to run eight months and six days, at six per cent. in five months and thirteen days he pays Mr. B. \$221.48. Calculate the interest all ready paid and the balance due at the expiration of the note."
"I am willing to waver with some problems of this kind, but I refuse to wrestle with such hypothetical cases. And I will no longer weary my brain with the extraction of roots and more remote algebra problems. For the most part they are purely theoretical, and only bring vexation and confusion of spirit to the average human mind. Where they touch practical problems I have respect and gratitude for them. In the majority of them there is no earthly use."

CANADIAN CLUB
Dr. Pringle, of Yukon Fame, to Speak Here December 8—Prof. Leacock, Prof. Adams, Dr. Graham Bell and Others to Follow.

In the week of Dec. 6, probably on Tuesday evening, Dec. 8, at 6.15 p. m., Rev. Dr. Pringle, of Yukon fame, will address the Canadian Club at a luncheon in Keith's assembly rooms. The new dishes specially made with the club's crest will be used for the first time at this luncheon.
The only other speaker booked is Prof. Leacock, who will be here on the occasion of the club's annual meeting in February. Other meetings will intervene, but the speakers have not yet been secured.
At a meeting of the executive in the Times building yesterday afternoon there were present Dr. T. D. Walker, president; (Geo. A. Henderson, secretary; J. N. Harvey, treasurer; and Rev. G. A. Kuhring, Dr. R. F. Quigley, E. B. LeRoy, Dr. H. S. Bridges and A. M. Belding. The president, secretary and Dr. Bridges, Dr. Quigley and Mr. LeRoy were appointed a committee to arrange a programme of addresses. The secretary read correspondence and told of fruitless efforts to get Lord Milner, Sir Thomas Shaughnessy and a number of other speakers whom it had been hoped to have during the summer or fall. It was decided to correspond with Prof. Leacock, of Montreal, and with Dr. Alexander Graham Bell.
President Walker read a list of names of eminent Bostonians, sent him by a friend who is a member of the Twentieth Century Club, and it is possible that an effort will be made in conjunction with other members of the Canadian club to arrange for a visit from one or two of the distinguished men on civic reform and technical education.
