
REV. J. A. MACDONALD DECLINES NOMINATION FOR ONTARIO HOUSE

PITIFUL SCENES AT MOUTH OF MINE WHERE MEN ARE ENTOMBED

San Francisco, Nov. 16—Francis J. Heney, who for the last three years has been prosecuting the San Francisco bribery graft case growing out of the discharges of corruption in the Board-Schmidt administration, in 1907, and who was defeated for district attorney at the recent municipal election, has been re-appointed as assistant to the United States attorney-general and will leave for Portland this week to prosecute the Oregon land frauds in which he first became prominent.

CHINA AND JAPAN

New York, N. Y., Nov. 16—The recent treaties entered into by China and Japan as to the operation of coal mines along the South Manchurian Railroad and the Antung-Mukden Railroad, do not create monopolies and hence are not violations of the "open door" or the "equal opportunities" principles, to the observance of which all of the leading powers are pledged.

"BLIND PIGS" ARE RAIDED; FINES OF \$2,000 IMPOSED

A Big Day in the Cobalt Court as Result of Sunday Raid on Illegal Liquor Sellers in the Mining Districts—Many Dealt With

Cobalt, Ont., Nov. 16—(Special)—Yesterday was a great day in the police court, charges being arraigned on a total of 17 licenses of running "blind pigs" as the result of a big raid made on Sunday night. Some sensational evidence relative to dispensing of liquor was brought out. All the accused men were found guilty and heavily fined, the province offering, as a result, being swelled by about \$2,000.
