CLINTON.—This Mission is steadily improving, financial-ly, numerically, and spiritually. A commodious shed has been built on the town property; but a new church is already needed, as the present building is filled to overflowing. The social means are also better attended. The Holmesville friends are preparing to build a new shed. Mount Pleasant has suffered from want of pastoral visitation. An increase of 25 members is reported.

FENELON appears to be about as reported a year ago. Membership the same; deficiency in Sabbath School Scholars and finances; 14 admitted during the year, have been counterbalanced by removals and unfaithfulness.

GREY has somewhat advanced, showing an increase of 7 members and 10 scholars. The financial state is improved, and, on the whole, there is room to hope for a brighter day for the Missions than until now was thought possible.

HAMILTON.—By resolution of last Conference, this City was placed on the list of Stations, and on the arrival of Bro. W. Kenner from England, in September last, he was appointed by the Executive Committee to take charge of it. A number of families at once united, and some others have since turned in with us—so that we now report 22 members. A serious drawback, for several months, was the want of a suitable place in which to worship. This, however, has been corrected by the purchase of a very suitable property on which quite a commodious church was already erected. Since taking possession of our own property, the congregations have been less fluctuating, and have materially increased. We think that energetic and united efforts will soon place the Bible Christian Church in a good position among the evangelical churches of the City.

The HUNGERFORD Mission has had the advantage of two laborers during the past year and appears to have been advantaged proportionably. A new church has been opened, almost free of debt; and the Tweed church, long in disuse because sadly out of repair, is now undergoing improvements and will soon be ready for use again. Quite a number have been admitted during the year; but after making up for unfaithfulness and removals, the numbers stand about the same as last year. The Sabbath scholars have apparently, but not really diminished.

HUNTINGDON.—The connexional property has been improved, and, as a consequence, the Missionary is *minus* his salary. The new Parsonage must, on such a field as Huntingdon, have been a pretty heavy tax; but the old house
