Preparations continue at Camp Sussex for the inspection by the Duke of Cornwall on Saturday, Bayreuth have been issued and the first bayonet drill took place yesterday.

Lieut. Lamb, to D. Company; Lieut. Coster, to C. Company; Lieut. Murray, to B. Company. Lieutenants Patchell and Auld have reported for duty.

A tent has been erected near the officers' mess to be used as a Post Office. Sergt. R. W. Gregory, now on duty, whose son was recently wounded, has a rather unique record on the roll of honor. Besides his two sons, who are at the front, he has three grandsons, two nephews and one son-in-law to use his own words. "We have given all we have."

Lieut. A. H. Sturney to be corporal. Corporal S. Nicholson to be sergeant. Corporal S. A. Lewis to be sergeant. Sergeant S. Hetherington, to be company-sergeant-major; Lance Corporals G. Emsman, S. M. McBeth, E. Perry, to be corporals. Private J. M. MacDonald, A. Marshall, A. S. Stewart, to be lance corporals.

Lieut. B. Smith arrived yesterday with forty men who have been recruited at Sackville.

The word which has gone out that the battalion is approaching its required strength is far from the fact. Including the overseas company this would be true but when this company have been taken out, at least five hundred men will be required. About fifteen or twenty per day are being added to the strength.

Five From St. John.

Five recruits for the 55th were sent up to the camp last night from St. John to join the unit. This makes a total of sixty raised here since Sergeant London took charge of the recruiting office—a period of ten days—which is a very creditable showing indeed. Besides there are thirty-five applications at present under consideration, and each day there is reason to believe that the interest is growing among the young men of the city.
