

## KEPT SHOP WITH GOODS HE STOLE

Vienna Police Finally Get Grip on Jewel Thief

Ran Attractive Jewelry Store and Kept Goldsmiths Busy Melting Down

VIENNA, March 8.—(United Press.) Europe's master thief, Joseph Moransky, 38, is again behind the bars; and the Vienna police are determined that this time he shall stay.

A goldsmith by trade, a "front-door thief" by profession, Moransky has been a source of concern to the police of almost every Central European city for several years. Many times he has been jailed but never for long. He always escaped after a few days. Several years ago, when almost every one in Vienna was wondering where the next meal was to come from and when the bankers were the only persons who were doing any business, the Viennese were astonished to see a new jewelry business appear in their city. Concerning the proprietor of the store no one knew anything except that he kept it constantly supplied with most rare and beautiful ornaments which a lady could desire. No order was too extraordinary or too difficult for him to fill. Whether it was for a diamond tiara or a sapphire shoe-buckle he guaranteed delivery.

KEPT GOLDSMITHS BUSY. All that he asked of his customers was a few weeks in which to "obtain the necessary supplies."

In a room just over his store Moransky kept six goldsmiths busy melting down old jewelry and making new pieces for his customers. At times he would be away from his business for several months. Where he went no one knew.

All was going well with Herr Moransky, the jeweler, until a notorious thief in Budapest mentioned his name during a cross-examination on other matter. The Budapest police at once notified their colleagues in Vienna that Moransky might be observed. The Vienna police placed a detective on Moransky's trail.

For a long time the detective could get nothing definite against Moransky. He invited the police of all the surrounding countries to send him lists of valuables which had recently been stolen in their districts. In vain, however, did he search the counters of Moransky's shop for these jewels—the goldsmiths upstairs had done their work too well.

A thief stolen in Zurich proved Moransky's undoing. It was so beautiful that he had placed it on sale without reworking its setting. The detective spotted it and arrested him.

Following Moransky's arrest the police of many cities were invited to come and inspect his stock. Here they found jewelry from almost every corner of Europe. Afterwards they visited Moransky in his cell. He told several of them identified him as a thief who had escaped from jails in their country.

Among Moransky's possessions was one of the finest cut of burglary tools ever seen by the Vienna police. These tools were his "reserves." His usual methods was to carry with his hundreds of keys. On Sunday he would pick out the shop of his choice, open it in broad daylight, and take what he wished from it as though he were a clerk who had been let in by the owner of the shop. the times when he had been "delayed" in the jails of foreign countries. In the Vienna jail Moransky has been awarded the honor of a special guard whose sole job is to see that he does not cut his visit short here as he has done in other cities. In order that he may not get away too easily he is given a different cell each day.

## DOG SAVES MASTER FROM SURE DEATH

Shep, an old collie dog, a few days ago saved Walter C. Kelley, 45 years old, a prominent dairy farmer of Glenmount, Md., from being gored to death by an infuriated bull, says the Washington Post.

## ROBBED MOTHER OF NEST EGG IN BANK

Montreal Man Given Two Years in Penitentiary For Misappropriation

MONTREAL, March 8.—For robbing his mother of \$3,500, J. H. Trudeau must spend the next two years in the penitentiary. The sentence was meted out by Judge Lacroix after he had reached a verdict of guilty on evidence showing that Trudeau, after obtaining the money on a pretext from his mother, Mrs. Horace Trudeau, refused to render an account of it or even tell her what he had done with it. The trial revealed that the complainant had received the money when he obtained a judicial separation from her husband. The funds represented her share in the community of property, which was dissolved by the judgment of separation. She deposited the money in a local bank. Her son, J. H. Trudeau, the accused, kept insisting that she ought to deposit the money in another bank for greater security. He said that he ought to put it in a "government" bank and finally he prevailed
