"You can talk all you like about that guy Nurmi. I want to tell you that Shrubb was the greatest runner that has lived," began Wefers. "Why, let me tell you of one example of his endurance and his speed and his methods of training. I was timing him for a five-mile spin one afternoon and he was about 40 yards from 'home' when one of his shoes flew off. Did he finish? No! He stopped, picked up his shoe, laced it on again, and, standing up said: 'Bernie, I'll have to begin my work all over again.' And, believe me or not, he ran five more miles in exactly 25 minutes, 20 seconds.
