INSISTS GERMANY IS MENACE IN AIR  
French Aviation Official Declares Allies Should Watch Builders

Paris, Dec. 14.—In an interview here M. Eynac, Under Secretary of State for Aviation, insists upon the reality of the German air menace and the necessity of maintaining inter-allied surveillance of German output of aircraft. He points out that the German air industry, restricted in Germany, immigrated to neutral territory. The Zeppelin Company has established itself at Danzig and in the Baltic States. Other German aircraft-makers are building in Spain and Scandinavia, in Switzerland, and even in Italy. An unattractive mystery, however, is the production of aircraft by German engineers and specialists in Russia. In spite of the difficulty of obtaining information it is believed that in Russia German engineers are making great efforts, both in the construction of aeroplanes and in the search for new and more dangerous explosives and poison gas.

Technicians who had examined the parachute in question and worked out its possibilities by scientific formula, concluded that it would not serve since, owing to its smallness, its passenger would, when it opened, suffer a shock equal to the strain of 1,200 pounds which would be felt by the jumper.


DEMAND INCREASE OF A DOLLAR A DAY
