LOCAL NEWS

The prize winners were Miss Lillian Codner, Miss Butler, Mr. Winter and E. Shaw. The evening passed very pleasantly and was brought to a close with the singing of the national anthem.

Alyre Gallant identified the bicycle and Detective Biddiscombe told of finding the wheel in Levine's home. James Lampert also gave evidence.

At a meeting of the corporation of Trinity Church held on Thursday evening, a purse of gold was presented by the pastor, Rev. R. A. Armstrong, by the senior warden, F. J. G. Knowlton, on behalf of the congregation. Canon and Mrs. Armstrong will leave next week for Scotland where Canon Armstrong is to officiate at the delegates to the Rotary Convention.

The local detectives rounded up two more men yesterday afternoon in connection with a quantity of cloth. They were John C. Gardner and Hebert J. Aldous, who were charged with breaking into the tailor shop of Michael McCarthy in Charlotte street on February 23, 1921, and stealing a quantity of cloth. They were brought before the magistrate yesterday afternoon and pleaded guilty to the charge. The web of cloth stolen was valued at \$80. In addition to this web, six suit lengths of cloth were stolen at the same time. The detectives have covered all the stolen goods in the houses of the two men.

EXPORT TRADE DULL

Washington, May 21.—(By Canadian Press.)—A report from the U. S. trade representative at Calcutta states that export trade generally is very dull. Indian holders of wheat are still disinclined to sell, and there is little trade in cotton or seeds. In Bombay business is being boomed. Improvement in exports to Japan is noted, but exports to other countries are very few in comparison with normal measures or exports. The market is overstocked with various classes of merchandise, such as piece goods, hardware, and other staples.

JOCKEYS INJURED WHEN HORSES FALL

Connelly Has Jaw Broken and Barnes is Bruised in a Spill at Louisville.

Louisville, Ky., May 21.—An accident, in which two jockeys were painfully hurt, occurred in the final race of Churchill Downs after a large field of horses had been sent away on a mile and a sixteenth journey. Tugs, on which Jockey Barnes and the mount fell at the first turn, throwing his rider, and Nonnie collided with the fallen horse, throwing his rider. Sterling had to jockey sustained a compound fracture of the jaw, but Barnes escaped with a few bruises. The track surgeon examined the boys and said neither had sustained internal injuries. Both of the fallen horses escaped without injury.

CELEBRATION OF EMPIRE DAY IN FAIRVILLE

Fairville school was in gala attire yesterday for the celebration of Empire Day. The exercises were held outdoors and were participated in by all the children of the seven rooms. The patriotic choruses were particularly well sung and all the numbers were most commendable and great credit was reflected on the teaching staff who had so carefully prepared the children for the day.

ROME FIGHTS PROFITEERING

Arbitral Commissions to Make Traders Refund Exorbitant Profits Suggested—Some Cases of 478 to 900 p. c. Profits.

Rome, May 21.—(A. P. by mail).—An attempt is being made here to curb outrageous exactions of profiteers by establishing arbitral commissions which have power to compel traders to refund exorbitant profits and to impose unusual forms of punishment.

One method of bringing profiteers to terms is to first compel them to restore their ill-gotten profits and then display for one month in their shops an official certificate of the amount of their profits and account of their gouging methods and the punishment imposed upon them.

These steps are the results of public exasperation over the excessive profiteering by retailers.

The Italian government first tried other methods to shame the Roman shopkeepers into charging only a fair and honest profit. One of these efforts was to compel the retailers to publish the price they asked for every article; but it was of no avail.

Now the people are resorting to the new provincial arbitral commission, which seems likely to achieve results.

One of the cases recently handled by the commission was that of two chemists who had charged from 478 per cent to 900 per cent profit, and the druggist was compelled to hang in his shop a record of the case against him.

In another case a wholesale stationer, who had charged a profit of \$8.25 on a quire of paper, was compelled to refund all except a fair profit.

The actions of the commission are hailed with delight by people of the middle class, who have felt more severely the exactions of the profiteers. Their incomes have not increased in proportion to those of the wage-earners, who now are paid from seven to nine times as much as before the war.

FIVE DOMINION COAL MINES DOWN YESTERDAY

Glouce Bay, N. S., May 21.—For the first time in more than a week, five mines of the Dominion Coal Company were idle yesterday, owing to lack of demand for coal. All the mines have worked steadily for nine days.

NEW REPORT ON NEW BRUNSWICK

A new report on the Province of New Brunswick has just been issued by the Department of the Interior through the Natural Resources Intelligence Branch at Ottawa. This report is a complete revision of one published by the Department in 1918 and contains a quantity of valuable and useful information not included in the previous publication. In the preparations of this report assistance was rendered by the several departments of the Government of New Brunswick and by various boards of trade and business firms in the Province. The publication provides not only an accurate account of the natural resources of the Province, with important details useful for libraries and general readers, but also much practical information of assistance to agricultural settlers, financial investors and tourists. There are chapters on the geology, history, government, finance, education and transportation facilities of the province. Descriptions are given of the chief cities and towns and the advantages which the Province possesses for foreign trade are clearly shown. Natural resources of New Brunswick have been fully treated under the divisions of agriculture in all its various phases, the forests, minerals and mining, fisheries, game and furs, while the extensive water powers have been scientifically described. The report is illustrated with interesting photographs. Statistical tables on temperature, rainfall, population, finance, exports and imports, production, etc., together with maps and plans, are included. A full bibliography of reports and works on New Brunswick is appended. The report may be had free upon application to the Superintendent, Natural Resources Intelligence Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa.
