SIDELIGHTS ON AFFAIRS IN THE MOTHERLAND

In a letter to the London Times on the task of the nation, J. A. R. Marriott writes: "There are, however, three expedients which could and should be resorted to at once: (1) The State, which is penniless, should refrain from spending what it has not got, except upon absolute necessities. This does not sound difficult, but it calls for high courage in those who initiate and control policy and for unselfishness among departmental administrators, some of whom must see their jobs disappear. (2) Individuals who have money to spend must refrain from spending it, except on necessities. This sounds hard, especially upon those who have practised voluntary abstention during the last five years but nothing would do more to reduce prices. Can any reasonable person be expected to follow this counsel of perfection? Only on one condition: that there is a restoration of economic confidence, and that irresponsible financiers refrain from advocating schemes which will penalize thrift and put a premium upon personal extravagance. The taxation of war profits, for instance, is an attractive cry, and I should cordially support the project, provided a scheme could be devised which would not penalize the thrifty and allow the selfish and the extravagant to go free. (3) Above all, some responsible statesman who is willing to risk place and popularity (and has both to lose) must have the blunt truth, that if they want to see a reduction in the price (as distinct from the value) of commodities they must be prepared to face a reduction in money (as distinct from real) wages. Such a warning may have been issued, but I have not seen or heard of it. It is a word that needs to be spoken, and spoken now."

Sidney Low, writing to the Times about Sir Reginald Wingate, says: "It is not too much to say that the magnificent campaign of Allenby in Palestine and the achievements of the Arab tribesmen under the Emir Faisal and Col. Lawrence, would have been alike impossible but for the wise forethought and political action of the administrators of Khartum and Cairo. Nor should the very brilliant and admirably executed little campaign against Ali Dinar of Darfur, arranged and directed by Sir Reginald Wingate, be forgotten. Here again it was not deemed judicious of the time to advertise operations, carried out chiefly by Moslem troops against a fanatical Moslem ruler. Now that the war is over the full story should be told of this march of a Sudanese force, led by a few British officers, over a thousand miles of scrub and waterless desert, and of the fierce battle of El Fasher, in which they crushed the hordes of a powerful African potentate, who had been well supplied with modern weapons and munitions by the government of the Sudan. As the result of a large, rich and turbulent native kingdom has now been definitely placed under the government of the Sudan, and will enjoy the tranquillity and growing prosperity of that vast tract of tropical Africa under the strong and humane rule of Lord Kitchener and his successors."

The war demonstrated that aviation was far beyond the experimental stage, and so important was the role it played in the Allies' fight for victory that one of the first after-the-war problems to receive governmental attention in many countries was the extension of air service for practical and commercial purposes in peace times. The Chinese government is among those that realize the value of aviation for practical and commercial uses, and, according to the American chamber of commerce in London, it has just placed a contract for a large number of commercial airplanes with Messrs. Vickers, Ltd., of London, who are floating a \$9,000,000 issue of treasury notes, the entire proceeds of which will be used to purchase the planes.

CHINA BUYS AIRPLANES.

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Canefax Now Leads.

Cleveland, Nov. 19.—R. L. Canefax of New York took the lead in the three cushion billiard championship tournament tonight by a sensational victory over Pierer Maupome of Milwaukee, fifty to forty-six in fifty-seven innings. In the forty-eighth inning Maupome was twelve points behind. He passed Canefax in the fifty-fourth inning by two. A fine of twenty shillings or eleven days was imposed.

Because of the spectacular rise in silver, which makes the Chinese dollar now worth over twice as much in British currency as it was before the war, it was considered advantageous for the Chinese government to place this contract for airplanes in Great Britain.

It is understood that the government will use these airplanes to organize communications in districts where there are no railways and, in addition to supplying the planes, the Vickers people will erect large workshops and hangars in China and send out experienced air pilots to train Chinese fliers.
