


The rest of the seventy-eight patrons of the hotel were driven into the street. partly clad, and were taken care of in nearby hotels and restaurants.


J. V. Jordan, manager of the Lorraine, is unable to tell the cause of the fire. The property loss is estimated at \$200.000.
