THREE DIE IN A PROVIDENCE HOTEL FIRE

Lorraine Nearly Destroyed in Early Morn and Patrons Are Driven to Street.

Providence, R. I., Feb. 18.—Three lost their lives in a fire which virtually destroyed the Lorraine Hotel here early today. Samuel Warwick of Harrisville was so badly injured in jumping from a window that he died in hospital. Two bodies believed to be those of Lewis B. Kunz of Centerville and E. F. Robert of Boston were found in the ruins. The rest of the seventy-eight patrons of the hotel were driven into the streets, partly clad, and were taken care of in nearby hotels and restaurants. J. V. Jordan, manager of the Lorraine, is unable to tell the cause of the fire. The property loss is estimated at \$200,000.

EXPECT TO HAVE \$12,000,000. Up to Last Night \$11,321,089 Received in Inter-Church Forward Movement. Toronto, Feb. 17.—With incomplete returns at the close of the financial campaign in connection with the inter-church forward movement of the Methodists, Presbyterians, Anglicans, Baptists and Congregationalists of Canada, the splendid total of \$11,321,089 has been piled up tonight. Confidence that the original sum aimed at \$11,440,000, would be largely oversubscribed, was expressed by the officials of the national campaign headquarters here, and it is believed that more than \$12,000,000 may be reported when the returns are all in. This may take several weeks.
