SUDDEN DEATH OF LIEUT. COLONEL A. J. ARMSTRONG

Lieut.-Colonel A. J. Armstrong, a prominent and well-known citizen of St. John, died yesterday morning as the result of a paralytic stroke. Colonel Armstrong was quite well until soon before his death and although he was seventy-six years old, he looked hale and hearty, so that news of his death came as a great shock to his many friends in the city.

He was born in this city on October 20, 1843, and for some years was engaged in business here, until at the age of eighteen he enlisted in the ranks of the old New Brunswick Brigade of Garrison Artillery. He won his commission and rose to the rank of major which he held in the North End battery. After a few years in the service he joined the Imperials. He was a prominent member of the Garrison Artillery and was until a few years ago was paymaster and superintendent of military properties in New Brunswick. He was also the Quebec ter-centenary he was the general ordnance officer at Quebec for the whole of Canada and just before the South African war when all the troops and equipment were being returned, he was in charge of all the stores at Halifax.

After thirty-five years of service in the Imperial army, Colonel Armstrong was superannuated about nine or ten years ago, with the rank of colonel. He was prominent in the Loyal Orange Association, being a past grand master in that order, which office he held for many years. At one time he was deputy grand master of British North America, holding this office for thirteen years, during the time that Hon. N. Clark Wallace was grand master. He also took an active part in the temperance movement, holding the office of grand secretary in the Sons of Temperance for New Brunswick. He was a charter member of the Knights of Pythias and the first grand secretary of that society for this province, he was a prominent Free Mason and a member of many other societies.

In his younger days Colonel Armstrong was prominent in the city volunteer fire department and among his treasured possessions were the red engine room key and his wrench and helmet.

In religion he was a member of the Church of England, attending St. John's (Stone) church for the last fifteen years and for a number of years he was a vestryman in that church.

Colonel Armstrong was a collector of arms, especially firearms, and had one of the finest collections in Eastern Canada. He was very much respected by all who knew him and was one of the most popular men in the community. He leaves to mourn two sons, T. E. G. Armstrong and Robert J. also three daughters, Mrs. A. E. Jubien, Mrs. A. E. Fleming and Mrs. F. J. Lively, all of St. John.

The funeral will be held from St. John's (Stone) church at 2:30 (daylight time) on Tuesday, June 3.

DEATHS IN INDIA RIOTS ABOUT 400

London, June 1.—(Reuters)—In the House of Commons at question time on Saturday Sir Edwin Montagu, secretary of state for India, said that he understood the total deaths and injuries in the riots in India were about 400, including eight or nine Europeans. The damage was a million pounds sterling.

Toronto, June 2.—Rev. John Somerville, treasurer of the Presbyterian church and clerk of the general assembly of the Presbyterian church in Canada, died at his home here yesterday. He was born in 1846.

Miss Charity Cecelia Hayes.
Charity Cecelia, daughter of E. Alfred Hayes, aged forty-six years died on Saturday, May 31, at her home in Bloomsfield Station (N. B.). She is survived by her father, three brothers and four sisters. Much sympathy is extended to the bereaved relatives in their loss.

Thomas Lowe.
The many friends of Thomas Lowe will regret to hear of his death which occurred at his home, Sandy Point road, on Saturday morning May 31, after a short illness from pneumonia. Mr. Lowe was a well known farmer and will be missed by a large number of friends. He is survived by his wife, two sons, William, of the United States, and James G. of this city, and by two daughters, Mrs. James Waterworth, New Bedford (Mass.), and Mrs. B. Edwards, of England. William Atherton, of this city, is a nephew.

LOCAL NEWS

Major Rev. E. B. Hooper, was given an enthusiastic welcome in Moncton by the members of his former congregation and his many friends. Major Hooper, lectured in St. George's church Saturday evening on his experience overseas.

There were two transfers of real estate at Chubb's corner on Saturday noon. The three story brick building, at the corner of Water street and Peter's wharf, belonging to the estate of the late Charles B. Lannan, was sold for \$8,400. The property in Union alley was sold for \$5,500 to Aquila Hopkins.

The Adriatic left London for Halifax on Saturday with 106 officers, eight nurses and 1,949 other ranks, including the 78th Battalion, 88th Battalion, 14th Field Ambulance, and some men from Kinnaird Park and repatriated men from the Imperials. The 88th is for dispersal in Halifax.

The C. G. R. summer schedule went into operation yesterday with the resumption of Sunday trains. The regular Halifax train left here yesterday at 12:50 o'clock (noon) while the express from the sister city came in at 5:20 p. m., as through the week. L. E. R. Road minimal agent, said last evening that the 9 o'clock morning suburban train would not go on before June 23.

On Saturday morning at the office of the Bradstreet Company Miss Mary C. Harrison was presented with a beautiful electric reading lamp by W. F. Godard, local superintendent of the company, on behalf of the staff. Miss Harrison, who has been on the staff for some time has resigned her position with the company. She is to be a June bride.

The members of the permanent fire force of the city have been organized and have formed a union, affiliated with the Fire Fighters' International Union. This new city union received its charter last week and held a meeting yesterday afternoon, when the following officers were installed: Wm. White, president; John Douglas, vice-president; S. Seeds, recording secretary; Charles Perry, financial secretary, and John Cunningham, treasurer. The union has at present a total membership of forty, and is open to all members of the force, both permanent and volunteer.

A large congregation attended a memorial service yesterday morning in the Mission church St. John Baptist, Paradise Row, for members of the congregation who have laid down their lives in the war. Father Bennett was celebrant and Father Young preached. The names of the following ten men were read and prayers were offered for them: Alexander Whitehead, John Leggett, Robert Gabriel, William Ramsay, Douglas Mowbray, Charles Williams, Foster Brown, Howard Logan, Frederick Wolfe and Frank Garter.

HOME COMING TROOPS FROM SIBERIA ARE FREE FROM QUARANTINE

Victoria, June 1.—Under instructions from Ottawa, troops from Siberia held in quarantine since Wednesday night, are to be released immediately. Of the 1,500 men put ashore from the liner Empress of Russia, only eight men will be detained at Williamshead. The first detachment will leave at one o'clock this afternoon for Vancouver. One of the two men suffering from smallpox, Private Massey, of Alberta, died last night.
