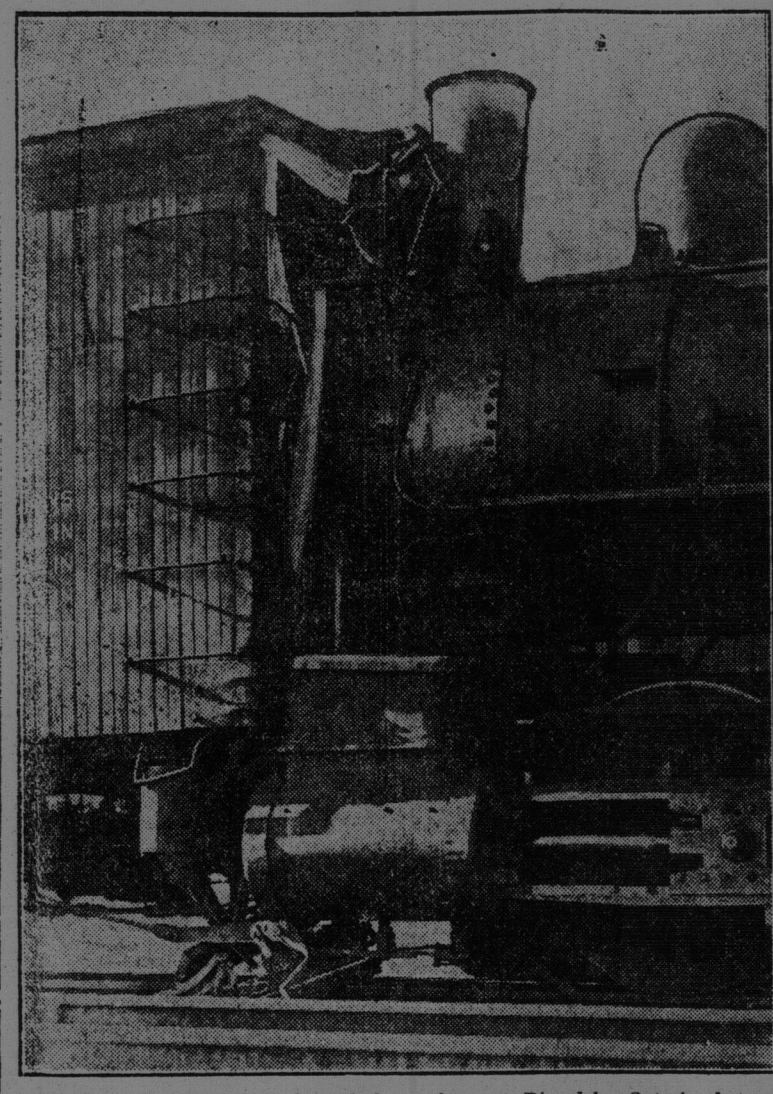
BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE

EXPRESS OFFICIALS HERE TODAY; THEY CONFER WITH MAYOR

Visiting officials of the Dominion Express Company, who, with local officials and the Canadian Express officials are arranging for fixing the delivery limits throughout the maritime provinces, arrived in the city this morning.

The party included V. G. R. Vickers, of Montreal, superintendent of the Atlantic Division; W. H. Barr, of Toronto, traffic manager; W. A. Walsh, of Toronto, general superintendent; and F. W. Brannan, of St. John, route agent, all of the Dominion Express Company, and H. C. Creighton, superintendent of the Canadian Express Company.

A partial inspection of the city limits was made this morning by Mr. Barr, accompanied by J. R. Haycock and Joseph Taylor, the local agents. Their trip was breaking down.

Later in the morning these gentlemen, with Mr. Walsh, called on Mayor Frank and discussed with him the proper limits for delivery. They said that they had received no complaints from St. John regarding the present arrangement and promised to submit a plan to the mayor showing the extent to which they thought the deliveries should extend.

The inspection of the outlying parts of the city will continue this afternoon. The officials were the guests of Mrs. Downie at luncheon at the Union Club. They will leave this evening and will visit Sussex and Moncton, and will then continue their trip through Nova Scotia.

The arrangements which they are making are due to the ruling of the Board of Railway Commissioners that the companies should make deliveries to any place within the limits of the cities in which they operate, except where special rulings are made.

Mr. Vickers, who is with the party, said that the addition of the Maritime Express Company to their lines had meant a large increase of business in that territory as the through rates have been substantially reduced.
