PUTS BLAME ON GOVERNMENT

Dr. J. E. Hetherington Recalls Critics at Time Central Railway Bridge Was Rebuilt

The blame for the collapse of the Central Railway bridge is ascribed by Dr. J. E. Hetherington of Cady's Station, to the negligence of the provincial administration when the bridge was rebuilt after the first year. He said that when the piers were destroyed the only foundation provided for rebuilding was a pile of loose stones dumped into the river.

Speaking of the possibility of reconstruction, Doctor Hetherington said that if they went at it in the way they did last year it would be an annual job as in the meantime the upper end of the road was entirely cut off.

WATCH THE LANDLADY; ADVICE TO BOARDERS

Later's Effects in Danger of Seizure if Former Does Not Pay Rent

Montreal, April 12—A boarder or lodger in a house, of which the boarding mistress is tenant, should keep a watchful eye on the landlady, also on the owner of the house, for, if the landlady fails to pay her rent, the proprietor has the right to evict her and seize all the furniture in the house, including the effects of the boarder, who may have been paying the rent in advance.

This was the ruling handed down by Mr. Justice Davidson in the case of the Prefontaine estate vs. Dame Morin yesterday. The only way the humble boarder can avoid his effects being seized when the landlady's rent is overdue is to notify the proprietor in advance.

GOVERNMENT TO APPOINT LOCOMOTIVE INSPECTORS

There Will Be One Each in Calgary, Winnipeg, Toronto and Montreal

Ottawa, April 12—An order in council will be passed in a day or so appointing, upon the recommendation of the board of railway commissioners, four expert locomotive inspectors, who will be stationed at various divisional points throughout the dominion.

The object is to increase the efficiency of the system of inspection now in force and to prevent, if possible, any increase in railway accidents in Canada. The new appointees are to be men of the highest standing, and mechanical experts. They will be stationed in Winnipeg, Calgary, Toronto and Montreal.
