Hardware Markets

(Hardware and Metal.)

A sharp advance in turpentine is re-
corded this week, amounting to twelve
cents per gallon. This may be termed
one of the first lines to reflect conditions
which have followed signing of armistice
and is in line with situation as outlined
in Hardware and Metal during the past
few weeks.

There is no indication that the peak
has yet been reached. Government re-
ports from the United States show pro-
duction for the past season is no more
than required for United States needs.

It is further pointed out that next year's
production will not be any larger than
for the past season. With the heavy
demands to be met from overseas, it is
not hard to determine how prices will
go. It is also true that users face a situ-
ation which may develop into one of
decided seriousness, due to shortage
which may arise.

Linseed oil is another line which has
undergone a similar upward. Advances
of four to five cents have been regis-
tered, and indications point to even higher
levels as well within the realm of possi-
bility. Prices on seed have been recov-
ering from recent depression during
the past two weeks, and since Monday of
this week sharp advances have been

Another line of horse nails is included
in the list to go higher levels, prices
today being up just one cent per pound
over former figures. Lace leather has
gone higher, prices today being up about
twenty-five cents per pound over pre-
vious quotations. The steady decline in
available supplies of all leathers is a
factor extending to this class of goods
and resulting in increased prices.

Other lines included in the list to fol-
low the upward trend this week are
school crayons, carpenter's chalk, post
drills, blowers, forges, mouse and rat
traps, charcoal and wheelbarrows. An
advance of about 10 per cent. is re-
ported also in stocks and dies, screw plates,
pipe taps, hand taps, reamers, etc., im-
mediately effective. Vises, hand soap,
manila, and gimlet bits have also gone to
higher levels.

The trade as a whole looks forward to
a period of marked prosperity for Can-
ada. This is based on the fact that the
country is now in a position to be a net
exporter, over the approach of peace, rather
than the feeling in evidence that having
faced four years of war, in which many
dark days were strewn, prosperity should
be low and replacement is impossible
for some time to come with the ma-
jority of lines. This will probably mean
a steadily maintained basis of quotations.

Major Hayes has received advice that
