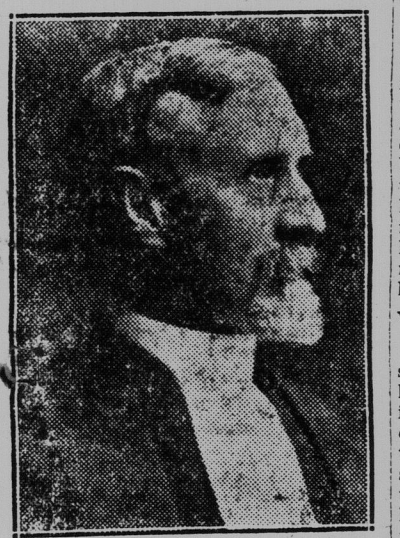

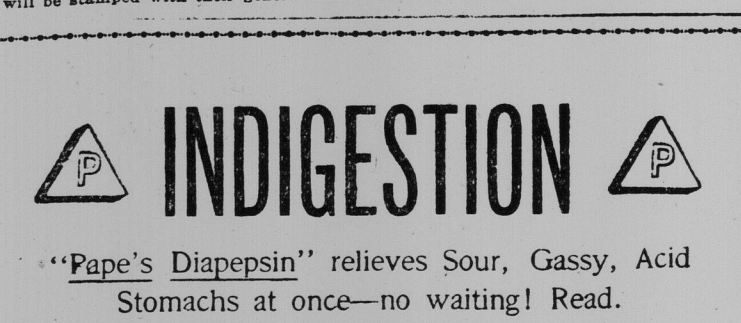

## A DOLEFUL WAIL FROM WIERINGEN

**Former Crown Prince is Not Enjoying Exile**

**LEADS BLAMELESS LIFE**

**Because "One Has To"—Pines For Society of Cultured People and Scientific Lectures on Interesting Subjects**

One gathers from an article in the New York Times by T. Walter Williams that the former Crown Prince of Germany is having rather an uncomfortable time on the little Dutch island where he is marooned partly through his own desire and partly because of the wishes of the German government. He is living in no guilty splendor, but in a four-roomed house, and the fact that it was formerly the residence of the village pastor is sufficient guarantee of the extreme simplicity of the surroundings. It has two bedrooms, one occupied by the prince, and the other by the two German officers who share his exile. His valets live in adjoining quarters. There is no bathroom in the house, of course, and the kitchen, where a German chef presides, is situated in a small wooden structure built in the front garden. From photographs we would gather that the place would rent for about \$8 a month to a Hollander, and that the prince may have to pay as much as \$8. In the summer the village and the surrounding country are very pleasant to the eyes but in winter—

### A Tough Winter.

Hark to the wail of the Hohenzollern: "The winter months from November to May are simply too awful for words. The cold nearly killed me and I still have to keep fires in the bedrooms on account of the north wind which blows cold at night. Then, the fogs, the rain and the snow with the ice jammed up on the trips of the Zuyder Zee which cuts off Wieringen from the mainland make conditions so wretched that I thought I should die. It was literally impossible to keep warm. The nights were long and I missed the society of cultured people. I am fond, too, of the opera and good music and scientific lectures on interesting subjects—all lacking in Wieringen." Plainly the sort of life that the prince is having has its horrors much greater than those to which he was personally exposed in the war. It is well known that the Crown Prince used frequently to entertain addresses from singers from Berlin at his headquarters. At Wieringen he leads a blameless life, and he added with a touch of regret, "One has to." His health appears to have improved, and many inquiring friends will be glad to know that the former heir to the German throne looks the picture of robust health and vigor.

### Will Return to Germany.

Apparently the prince is not under surveillance. There are no sentries at his door, and he roams about the little island at will. To leave it he might require the permission of the Dutch authorities, and he has made just one visit since he took up his residence. That was to see his mother at Amersfoort. He has not seen his father nor any other members of the family since last November. He plans to return to Germany when the peace treaty is signed and anticipates no objection raised in any quarter, but his father, he says, will collect for some time. ### Not Changed by War

Mr. Williams says that the Prince does not take the war seriously and comments upon it in the detached manner of an observer, rather than as a conspicuous actor. It had turned the world topsy turvy, he said, and it will be fifty years before normal financial, living and industrial conditions are restored. If it had stopped in 1917, before the United States took part, hundreds of thousands of lives would have been spared and conditions would be much better than they are today. He seemed to think that the Allies are to blame for having kept up the fight, and it is to be admitted that Germany did everything in her power to make the struggle short, and that history will hold his father primarily responsible for it, while it will probably decide that the son contributed largely to the plot against civilization. It is not to be inferred from this that the prince is insane. Indeed, he talks well and intelligently about current affairs. The answer to the riddle appears to be that he is common with the junkies.

### Putting in the Time

He is kept well supplied with reading matter, and has occasional visitors from Germany. One of them is Karl von Wiegand, the American newspaper correspondent, who comes sometimes to spend the week-end, and who is regarded as a personal friend. He makes it a rule not to talk to newspaper correspondents, he says, because of the garbled accounts of former conversations which have been published and because they have injured Germany, and have made his father furious. His lot, though, is not as unpleasant, he believes, as that of the ex-Kaiser, who is kept a virtual prisoner in a castle. The son takes trips on his motorcycle, although as the island is only six miles long and three wide, and has only 3,000 inhabitants, there is not much sport for the demon cyclist. He also sketches on the beach and plays handball in the garden. The place has been put on the map by his presence, excursionists from other points in Holland and it has become a favorite point for land and for honeymooners. The prince is constantly on view and repays the kindness of his Dutch neighbors by not resenting the extreme curiosity which they evince in all his comings and goings.

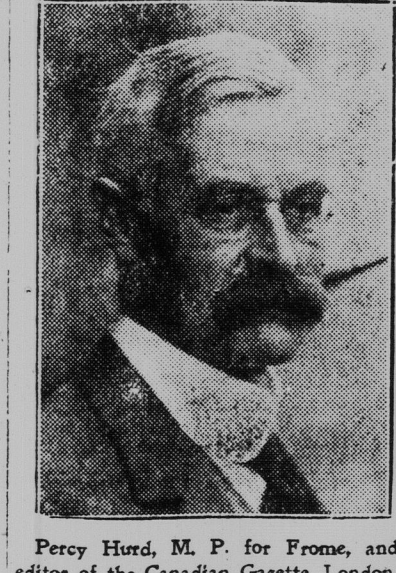

### THE PRICE OF MILK.

Moncton Transcript.—The price of milk during the summer here was thirteen cents per quart, delivered, and on September first was raised to fifteen cents per quart and eight cents per pint, delivered. The city council called a citizens' meeting and conference with the milk men but nothing developed by way of arrangement. The city council has now referred the Board of Commerce to visit Moncton and hold a session inquiring into the high cost of living locally and the milk question will also be brought before that body. The probabilities are that the Board of Commerce will hold a session here.
