The emigrants to Canada from Brit-
tain for June numbered 8,115, against
7,768 in 1908.A farmer near Kingston, charged
with delivering deteriorated milk to a
cheese factory was fined \$15.Three French battleships will partici-
pate in the Hudson-Fulton celebra-
tion at New York next month.The airship Zeppelin II again broke
a propeller blade yesterday and was
unable to leave Frankfurt for Cologne.Dog owners at St. Catharines may
hire a private detective to find out
dog poisoners, who have been busy
lately.At 2 p.m. the body of Mrs. G. A. A.
Tough, aged 48, wife of G. A. Tough,
traveler for the Sanitars Co., Ltd.,
was found in a well.The bursting of an immense reser-
voir near Fort Morgan, Col., deluged
half a mile of rich farming country
and did half a million dollars damage.The bylaw at Bracebridge to raise
additional water power at Wilson's
Falls, two miles up the Muskoka Riv-
er, was carried by over one hundred
majority.The Peary relief expedition sailed
yesterday afternoon on the schooner
Jeanie from St. John's, Nfld. The
vessel is bound for Etah, Greenland,
to obtain supplies for the Arctic
explorer.One hundred and seventy-five loco-
motives, to which an engine is added
every six days, are now ready to cou-
ple on to the 1,500 freight cars that
are ready to haul the wheat from the
two hundred elevators along the prairie
division of the G.T.P.

Uproar in Cortes.

Lisbon, Aug. 4.—Free thinkers from
all parts of Portugal, represented by
a Liberal committee, yesterday pre-
sented to the Cortes a petition for
the suppression of the religious or-
ders in Portugal and the abrogation of
the existing laws against freedom of
conscience.The committee was ac-
companied to the Houses of Parlia-
ment by an immense crowd. Among
other things the petitioners asked the
abrogation of the recent law permit-
ting religious associations to acquire
landed property.Senator Camacho moved the consid-
eration of the subject, and when the
motion was voted down, the galleries
broke out in protestation. The depu-
ties engaged in a struggle in which
desks and chairs were overturned and
the chamber had to be cleared twice.

England Must Control G.T.R.

Montreal, Aug. 4.—"Financial con-
trol of the G.T.R. must remain on
the other side," declared Sir Charles
Rivers-Wilson, president of the road,
in an interview here yesterday morn-
ing. British directors had the great-
est confidence in General Manager
Hayes, and the management was left
practically in his hands, but finan-
cial control was another matter. Cana-
dian directors with no great financial
interests at stake would be liable to
be lavished with the company's money,
and such a state of affairs, said Sir
Charles, would be detrimental to any
road.Sir Charles said that the G.T.P. could
make no alliance with the Alans or
any other steamship company till
their lines were completed.

Twice Injured; Farmer Dies.

Kincardine, Aug. 4.—Samuel Irwin,
aged 50, a well-known farmer of the
6th concession of Greenock, was en-
gaged cutting hay, when his team
started to run away, throwing him in
front of the knife. His thigh was
fearfully mangled.The horses were stopped and Irwin
was being conveyed home in a buggy,
when the team, which had been un-
hitched from the mower and left in
charge of his young son to bring
home, got away from the lad, and,
running down the road in the wake of
the buggy, one of them jumped into
it, crushing the injured man against
the dashboard, breaking his shoulder
and further injuring him. He lived
some hours.

Hon. Sydney Fisher Goes West.

Ottawa, Aug. 4.—Hon. Sydney Fisher,
Minister of Agriculture, left yester-
day on an extended trip through
Western Canada. He proposes to see
crops while standing, having heretofore
been in the west only after the
crops had been cut. Mr. Fisher will
travel by both train and team. He
will go over the Grand Trunk Pacific
and will make a number of addresses.
He will take six weeks to reach the
Pacific coast, and will visit the Se-
attle Exposition before returning.Hon. Mr. Fisher is the fourth Min-
ister of the Government to make a
western trip this summer.

Got Back at Constable.

St. Catharines, Aug. 4.—Constable
A. B. Tufford of Beamsville, was fined
\$2 and costs, amounting in all to \$4,
by Magistrate Higgins at Beamsville
for being drunk and disorderly.The constable secured liquor in this
city a few days ago. Beamsville be-
ing a local option town, and on re-
turning to Beamsville under its in-
fluence was espied by James Karr,
whom Tufford had arrested some time
ago, for being drunk. Karr laid the
charge against him.

London, Aug. 4.—Charles Wadge,
aged 70, claiming to be a Toronto

in a crowd on the train at Toronto
station about July 19 and did not get
off the train until he reached London.

CIVIC HOLIDAYThis is the Course That Should
Be Followed—The Board
of Trade.Both in point of attendance and the
business spirit manifested, last night's
meeting of the Board of Trade was
most gratifying. There was a marked
increase in the attendance as com-
pared with some of the previous meet-
ings and all the members were in a
working mood.

CIVIC HOLIDAY.

In connection with the proceedings
the question of Civic Holiday came
up. It would seem that there is con-
siderable agitation throughout the
town in regard to this holiday, but
as yet no effort has been made in the
usual way to have a date set. There
is somewhat of a "puzzle" aspect
about the situation, chiefly as to whether
the people really want the holiday
and the date that would be the
most suitable. After several of the
members had been heard on the mat-
ter, the verdict was "if the citizens
want a holiday let them petition for it."Mayor Sutherland in discussing the
question said in the past the custom
has been that some society or organ-
ization of some kind has petitioned
the council, not the Mayor, for some
specific date to be set apart as Civic
Holiday. This year, thus far, no such
representation has been made to the
council, and as a result it was diffi-
cult for them to determine what
date would be suitable to the
general public, there having been so
many holidays this season. In view
of this and the fact that the reunion
would create semi-holidays it had been
deemed wise by the council to defer
a selection of the date until some re-
quest has been received. The council
said the Mayor were not arbitrarily
refusing to grant a date, but merely
awaiting instructions. It was men-
tioned by the Mayor that one reason
why the Caledonian Society not
endorse a Civic Holiday during the
reunion week, was that they are well
satisfied with the fact that were busi-
ness suspended on either of these days
an unfavorable impression would be
given visitors. Financially, he said,
they would be far ahead if a holiday
was declared, but they desire as well
to favor the reunion, to impress upon
visitors that Ingersoll is one of the
most progressive towns in the provin-
ce of Canada.
