The Society now owes the Parent Society £450, besides the depository of Bibles.

Your Committee found it absolutely necessary to send Agents to visit the Branch Societies, and to form new ones. Some of the branches have been dormant for years, (it is now four years nearly since they were erected,) while some others are more active. Your Agents report that those of the East are likely to become more active, and to go on with new life. In travelling round the lake they found a disposition in most places to forward the cause. Societies are formed at Hamilton, St. Catharines, Drummondville, and Beamsville—and there is a prospect of Societies at some other places. A new one is formed at Brantford—the Waterford and Simcoe are revived, and every appearance of the same in Victoria. In Walsingham and Bayham the Societies are dead. The
