#### SLANDERING ST. JOHN.

It is not surprising that impatience not strong indignation, is felt by St John people when they hear over again the stale falsehood about the dangers of the Bay of Fundy and the unsuitability of this port as a terminus for ocean steamship lines. Years ago the oard of trade published a book on the subject, and more recently a second one, both of which established beyond question the safety of the bay route and the advantages of the port. These books have been reinforced by innum erable letters, and resolutions, and scattered broadcast among shipping firms in the old country and elsewhere. But even more convincing than these should be the record of the port since 1896. Steamers have been going back and forth every winter between St. John and Liverpool, Glasgow, London, Irish ports and Manchester. Each year nas seen a larger business. Steamers of the Allan, Elder-Dempster and other great shipping firms have made this port a terminus, and their experience in these years has given the lie direct to all the slanders concerning this route which have been circulated by interested parties or had their origin in an nexcusable ignorance.

Every advance made by the port has been accomplished in the teeth of preudice, and the battle is not yet won. We have yet to secure from the government full recognition of St. John as a national port. When that is done and the work of harbor extension is carried on as it should be; and Canadian ports are justly treated in the pplication of the preferential duty on British goods, St. John will have reeived her just dues-and no more. In the meantime the city council and poard of trade do well to meet every false statement with a prompt denial; and, the present discussion having arisen, the greatest possible publicity should be given to a re-statement of the advantages and facilities of th
