#### SKATING.

Johnson's Great Records.

Tom Eck, the veteran sporting promoter, who is well known as the discoverer of J. S. Johnson of Minneapolis, who a decade ago was the marvel of the skating and cycling worlds, says in a recent statement that Johnson was without doubt the fastest man who ever put on a skate. He adds: "Johnson skated a quarter of a mile in 28 seconds at Red Bank, N. J., from a standing start. That is the fastest performance on skates the world has ever seen. Another great performance of Johnson's was three-quarters of a mile on a circular track, in 1:54 from a standing start. Moreover, this was on made ice, which is not as good as lake ice."

"In his quarter in 28 seconds, Johnson traveled 156-7 yards a second. I am compiling skating records and I find that this performance of Johnson's eclipses any other for sustained speed. "Peter Oustland covered 1,500 meters in 2:23-5 on Mount Davos, Switzerland. He had the advantage of a perfect air and fine ice. This and Japan's 5,000 meters in 8:41 are the fastest skating performances ever done in Europe; but neither represents the speed attained by Johnson."

All of the foregoing is borne out by records but Eck closes with this "whisper": "I had a letter from Johnson, written from Minneapolis last week. He said he had just been out and done 100 yards in 7-4-5 seconds."

#### A JAP WHO WOULD BE A TWIRLER.

**ANN ARBOR, Mich., March 4.**—Athletics, classroom work and oratory are all specialties of K. S. Inui, a junior "Lit" in the University of Michigan. The young Japanese is thoroughly Americanized except that he still prefers the flowing robes of his native land to the close fitting garments of occidental civilization, and wears them whenever opportunity offers. Inui is at present a candidate for pitcher on the varsity baseball team. Twice each day he reports to Coach McAllister at the waterman gymnasium, and under the leader's instruction he has developed more speed than any other twirler in the squad. Inui has also acquired some curves and shoots that are likely to prove puzzling to opposing batsmen. His great difficulty, however, is lack of control. Owing to his wildness few of the varsity players care to attempt to receive his delivery, as the ball he throws is too speedy to handle with safety when the catcher doesn't know just where it is going. Inui is also versed in the science of jiu-jitsu. Several of the students here have taken lessons from him in the Japanese system of physical culture, and as interest in it is growing among the students it is likely that regular classes will be formed soon. Not only an athlete, however, is Inui gaining a reputation.

He is also an orator of no mean ability. Last year he was second in his class contest, and this winter he took first honors in it. This achievement puts him in the finale from which the representative of the University of Michigan in the Northern Ontario League is to be selected. He has delivered over 100 lectures in various parts of the state on the cause of the Japanese-Russian war. Johnson was without doubt the fastest man who ever put on a skate. He has taken a lively part in several elections recently, and is president of the Students' Lecture Association next year. This place is considered one of the "fat" ones of college life.
