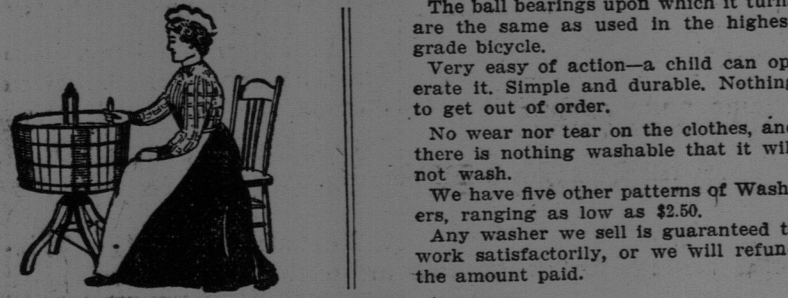

COAL DIRECTORS WILL MEET ON MONDAY

Ross Is Practically in Control of Affairs. But There Will be Strong Opposition to His Policy Though Nothing Startling Is Expected.

MONTRÉAL, Jan. 12.—A meeting of the Dominion Coal Company directors has been called for Monday at 10:30 a. m. and it is pretty well understood that the vacancies existing in the board by the resignations of Sir W. Van Horne and F. S. Pearson will be filled.

The present directorate of the Dominion Coal Co. are: Messrs. James Ross, president; F. L. Wanklyn, vice-president; Lord Strathcona, R. B. Angus, Hon. George A. Cox, James Reid Wilson, H. F. Dimock, Hon. David McKean and W. B. Ross.

There are 150,000 shares of common and 20,000 shares of preferred stock in the Dominion Coal Co., and it can be taken for granted that Mr. Jas. Ross and those who are working with him, have the situation well in hand. They have, in other words, absolute control of the majority of the stock.

PLANS FOR THE STRUCTURE WILL BE CHANGED ALONG THE LINES RECENTLY SUGGESTED BY ENGINEER PETERS

A special meeting of the board of works was held at City Hall this morning, Ald. Bullock presiding. Those present were: Ald. Holder, Sproule, Hamm, Rowan, Lewis, Baxter and Tilley and Harbor Master Ferris, Common Clerk Wardrop, Engineer Peters and Director Cushing.

The chairman stated that the meeting had been called so that several matters connected with the construction of the proposed new wharf might be discussed. He said that a difference in opinion was evident, as to how the new wharf should be built.

Director Cushing stated that he and the engineers started to draw up a plan but they found that the only way to build the wharf will be to construct it 200 feet on the northern face. Ald. Rowan said that an open crib could be put down. It would save timber and would serve the purpose just as well.

Engineer Peters stated that Ald. Rowan's suggestion was out of the question, as drift wood would get in and do damage. Ald. Baxter said that the wharf now being built would be available for the ferry boat when she is laid up. He mentioned the fact that an open faced wharf would not do, as drift wood might get in and do damage.
