## NEWCASTLE, MIRAMICHT.

.Rev. E. Hickson has spont a year and eight months in this field under our rationage. We were obliged to withdraw our assistance the first of May last. Is writes to us of good and stientive congregations, a mission house finished, and of increasing interast. . His report for the last nine months of his service iss follows: Preached 90 sarmons, attended 32 Conference Meetings, visited 39 families, and travelled 1080 miles. Concerning the withdrawal of our asistance, he says, "It is surely to be regretted that such reaction should age place in the churches, as to compel the Board, with its little corps of missionaries, to retreat before the enemy, and thus abandon the high and adranced position which they so lately occupied. I had hoped that a retreat from the North would never be sounded, but that we should have a reinforcement in Gloucester this very season.

"The churches in the North Esk and Little South West, have given me a mited call to become their Pastor, and will do all in their power for my (Signed) EDWARD HICKSON.

Bro. H. has given his attention also, during the Fall and Winter, towards securing the erection of a house of worship in Bathurst, his native town.

### RESTIGOUCHE.

During the past three years Bro. W. A. Crandal has been laboring in the Northern County, a part of which time he has been aided by your Board.
