The undertone at the change, however, remains confident. Domestic issues ended satisfactory but under the best prices. Americans closed irregular at the official session and were easier on the curb. The four trade continues quiet as dealers are expecting a reduction and are only taking sufficient stocks for their necessities. Any revival in the demand for bread-stuffs would inevitably produce a very active market. Local dealers' quotations:
