Fredericton, June 8.—Two squeeze plays pulled off in perfect style in the eighth inning won for the Fredericton team over the St. Stephen Thistles by a score of 5 to 4.

The baseball produced in the game was probably the classiest variety ever seen in Fredericton, and a closer and harder fought game could not be imagined.

Larry Conley was wild and was hit hard at times, but at critical moments he seemed able to pull himself together and air tight support in the pinches helped him out of a lot of

bad holes. Manager Pat Duggan played an excellent ball in left field, taking five chances, three of them being very difficult, and on hits that looked good for safeties.

With the score 3 to 2 in the eighth inning Manager Duggan drew a base on balls, stole second, and went on to third, when Gaggan let McGovern's rather poor throw away from him. Then Hughes got a base on balls, and it was up to George Finnamore. The squeeze play was tipped off and Captain Finnamore did his part perfectly, sending a roller down to Freddie. In the meantime Manager Duggan was not fooling it for home, and was across the plate almost as soon as the ball was hit, while Freddie was unable to get his man at first either.

While this was going on Hughes had perched on third, and with Tom May Howe at the bat the squeeze play was pulled off again catching the St. Stephen's infield off their guard, and Hughes scored. How being safe at first on a perfectly placed bunt on a hard ball to lay down. That made it five to three, and the Thistles got another in the ninth on hits by Jenkins and Kite, with Gillman's sacrifice between.

## N.B. LEAGUE WILL MEET NEXT WEEK

Several matters of considerable importance to the N. B. and Maine league will be discussed at a meeting of the league to be held some time next week. The provisional schedule published in The Standard yesterday will be before the meeting for approval or otherwise. The schedule was drawn up by experts and is a first class piece of work, but some changes may be necessary to adapt it to local conditions.

Another proposition which the league must face is the adoption of an official league ball. This year's sphere is livelier than the players have been accustomed to for some years owing to the increased size of the rubber core. While this makes for a more open game and one which is more interesting for the spectators, there have been some complaints regarding it from both the pitchers and the men in the other portions of the field. Half a dozen sporting goods firms are anxious to supply the league with any brand of ball they may think most suitable and the meeting will probably decide on the article they want and select the maker that appeals most favorably to them.

Owing to some dissatisfaction with the principle of relying on local men for umpires and because of the objection filed by the Woodstock team in both of the games they have played, the meeting will be asked to consider the advisability of importing professional umpires. If this idea meets with approval it will be necessary to get men from across the border, as there are none in the province who are of quality in that class.

It would be necessary to get three umpires to provide for the days all six teams are playing.

## BILLY PAPKE WON FROM ENGLISH MIDDLEWEIGHT

London, June 8.—Billy Papke, the American middleweight pugilist, tonight defeated Jim Sullivan, of England, in a 20 round fight, for the middleweight championship of the world. London, June 8.—Bill Papke, the American middleweight otherwise known as the "Hilinois Thunderbolt," tonight took the measure of Jim Sullivan, the middleweight champion of England, in nine rounds of fast and furious fighting. Again it was the fighter against the boxer, and the fighter won with ease.

The contest was for the middleweight championship of the world, a purse of \$10,000 and a side bet, it was pulled off under the management of Hugh D. McIntosh, the Australian promoter, who hired the Palladium, one of London's noted music halls, for that purpose and crowded it with the doors. Throughout the fight was a grueling one. Sullivan proved the more clever boxer at long range work, but Papke excelled at infighting.

### CANADA'S IMMIGRATION FOR THE MONTH OF APRIL

Ottawa, June 8.—The total immigration to Canada for the month of April 1911, was 51,680 as compared with 48,182 for April, 1910, the increase is 7 per cent. Of the total arrivals for the month 35,283 were at ocean ports, as against 24,880 during the corresponding month last year, an increase of 27 per cent. There was a falling off in the arrivals from the United States, in comparison with April last year, of 16,397, as compared with 20,363, about 19 per cent. decrease.
